

Nuclear buildup causes concern

Two SUHS teachers are making a commitment to stall the spread of nuclear warfare.

Judith Fisher, a speech teacher, set up a poster and wrote post cards, addressed to people such as U.S. Senator Bob Packwood, U.S. Representatives Les AuCoin and Ron Wyden,

Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger, and President Ronald Reagan.

Other teachers, who would have only had to pick up the cards and sign them, were slow to do so.

"People tend to be so fearful of nuclear war that they ignore it,"

Fisher said.

Jeanne Budd, likewise, has found that people are slow to sign her anti-nuclear arms buildup petition.

"Even if people don't want to think about it, we're still living with it," Budd said.

Fisher sees a contradiction in preparing youngsters for the future while at the same time nuclear weapons are being made that could eliminate it.

According to "Nuclear War—What's in it for You?," a book published by Ground Zero, at the end of 1981 the total destructive power of nuclear weapons of all nations represented ten tons of TNT for every man, woman and child on the face of the earth.

One of Fisher's cards reads, in part, "I am a U.S. Citizen who is opposed to the current escalation in the planning, production and deployment of nuclear weapons and their carriers."

"We must spend our money for life-fostering services such as food, shelter, education (and) medical services instead of weapons to destroy life."

"The present stockpile of nuclear arms is more than adequate (we can destroy the planet and annihilate its inhabitants only once)."

"Your attention to these concerns is greatly appreciated."

Budd said that some people who have refused to sign the petition did so as they believe that nuclear arms serve as a deterrent to war.

Talk of first-strike capabilities, however, have led Budd to believe a different course is necessary.

Also, a "Nuke the Whales" bumper sticker did not discourage her from getting involved.

The petition supports legislation co-sponsored by U.S. Senators Ted Kennedy and Mark Hatfield. Interested persons should contact Budd.

Quick action keeps gas out of creek

The state Department of Environmental Quality has praised the efforts of the Hoodland Rural Fire Department in preventing gasoline from escaping into a stream after the May 17 tanker accident near Government Camp.

Mark Frizler, DEQ information officer, said that after an Arrow Transportation Company tractor and trailer flipped over onto its side near the east end of the Ski Bowl parking lot on Highway 26, firefighters from the Hoodland station dug a moat

around the leak and lined it with heavy plastic.

Hoodland Fire Chief Don Armintrout had requested the relatively small trench dug as a precautionary measure while personnel from Crowley Environmental Services worked to pump the remaining 800 gallons into another tanker.

During the recovery operation a pressure release valve malfunctioned, spilling an estimated 300 gallons into the trench before being brought under control.

As a result of the firefighters' efforts it is estimated that only 50 gallons of gasoline escaped. None of this gasoline has been reported to

have reached nearby Camp Creek, but rather seeped down into the sandy soil along the roadway.

Fritzler said that a DEQ representative investigated the marshy area near a culvert that discharges storm water and snow-melt into the creek, and did not find any trace of the spilled fuel.

The cause of the accident is believed to be the result of obstructed vision due to fogged up windows, said Fritzler.

Fritzler said that when the driver, Clyde Calvin Cobb of Portland, attempted to pull over to the side of the road, he hit a steep bank and rolled. No citation was issued.

breathing apparatuses on by the time they reach the fire.

The end result, said Armintrout, is greater efficiency by being able to respond quicker to the situation.

Another safety feature with the new engine, said Armintrout, is its warning lights.

The new engine has six

rotating lights, compared with the old engine's single light.

Armintrout said the old engine will have a similar set of warning lights installed, which will make it more visible during emergency situations.

Due to the increased size of the engine Armintrout admitted that there are a few problems when turning

the vehicle around. In some situations it may require more work and skill in backing it up.

Another potential problem identified by Armintrout is the engine's weight.

There are some roads the new engine will not be able to travel down and there are some bridges that it will not be able to cross.

These same problems,

according to Armintrout, existed with the old engine also.

Armintrout said there exists currently 11 bridges in the area, which are privately owned, that the engine will not be taken across due to their existing conditions, which would jeopardize the safety of the crew.
