

Meadows Summerfestival set for August

Mt. Hood Meadows recently announced the presentation of "High Meadows Summerfestival," a summer weekend celebration of music and art to be held at Mt. Hood Meadows

August 20, 21 and 22. The "High Meadows Summerfestival" will combine the finest in Northwest music and art with the natural beauty of Oregon's Mt. Hood region. The Karen Whitman

Company, a Portland-based advertising and promotions firm, is collaborating with Mt. Hood Meadows to produce the first artistic and musical celebration ever held at the Meadows facility. For the

past five years, the Karen Whitman Company has been producer of Artquake, Portland's three-day festival of the visual and performing arts located in the downtown transit mall. Although the festival

schedule of events is not final, the "High Meadows Summerfestival" will include appearances by a variety of local musicians, with styles ranging from popular to country and bluegrass. The festival

highlight will be a performance by nationally known artists on August 21. In addition to an emphasis on music, the "High Meadows Summerfestival" will also feature works from Nor-

thwest craftsmen. A gallery of exhibits encompassing a spectrum of artistic mediums will be on display and for sale during the weekend festival.

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Charges higher at campgrounds

If you are planning to visit your favorite Forest Service campground this summer you might prepare yourself for some changes. According to Wendy Evans, forestry technician from the Zigzag Ranger District, campers will be faced with higher campground fees and reduced services this year.

"It's all economy and budget related," Evans said as she explained the changes. "First, we are trying to bring our campground fees more into line with what the private sector is charging."

"Second," she continued, "we are trying to recover more of our operating costs directly from the campground user rather than the general taxpayer."

As a result, the fees for camping at most National Forest campgrounds have increased. This year, for example, the fee for camping at Trillium Lake campground will be \$6 a night. Last year it was \$4 a night. Other fee increases on the district include Green Canyon campground, up from \$3 to \$5 a night, Riley campground, up from \$3 to \$4 a night, and McNeil campground, up from \$2 to \$3 a night.

The \$3 fee for camping at Still Creek campground remains unchanged this year.

An effect of Forest Service budget tightening is the reduction of services provided at campgrounds. This reduced service, ac-

ording to Evans, translates into a shorter operating season.

In Forest Service language, the operating season is the period of time that services such as drinking water, garbage pick-up and routine toilet maintenance are provided. It is also the time camping fees are charged.

This year the operating season for Green Canyon, Riley and McNeil campgrounds runs from the present through Labor Day.

Depending upon snow conditions, Trillium Lake and Still Creek campgrounds will operate from June 15 through Labor Day.

In the past, the operating season covered a longer period of time.

While operating seasons have been reduced, Evans was quick to point out that some campgrounds will operate on a "self-service" basis before and after the posted dates. There will be no services provided at those times and, therefore, no fees charged.

Two remote Zigzag campgrounds, Kinzel Lake and Fir Tree, will be operated as self-service campgrounds during the entire snow-free season. No fees will be charged.

Campers taking advantage of such free camping are advised that they will have to pack out their garbage. Toilets will not be serviced.
