Take-home pizza business set to go

A Damascus man in the real estate business hopes to make his new fortune in a revolutionary take-home pizza business with a Sandy base.

Don Dove has opened Togo's Pizza, Inc. with wife Pat and son Craig at 17480 Meinig Avenue next to Williams Thriftway.

Ironically, the site is the former location of Jonsrud & Lawson Realtors who have merged with Marcus Realty. Dove said he's studied new possibilities in the pizza business, because the real estate business has gone sour.

The Dove family prepare budget-priced pizza in three minutes that customers can take home to bake in 12-15 minutes.

That lowers the price, with only about 30 percent of the price of a pizza spent on on labor and a whopping 42 percent spent on food ingredients, according to Don Dove.

Eventually, Dove hopes to open three such in-and-out pizza stops he would operate in Estacada and east Portland.

Thus far, he says customer response has been good. A grand opening is planned sometime around Labor Day.

Phone-in orders are encouraged. Customers pick their ingredients to custom-order what they want. There's no set

menu. Hours are 4-10 p.m. weekdays and noon-10 p.m. Saturdays and Sundays.

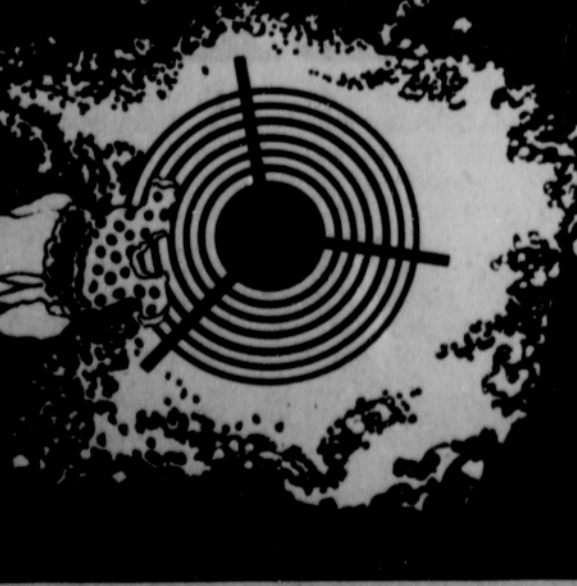

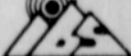
