Robert Ludlum's "The Parsifal Mosaic" is a taut, gripping story of spies, intrigue and romance.

"Concrete Mama," with photographs by Ethan Hoffman and text by John McCoy, tells the brutal, shocking and raw realities of life in the Washington State Prison at Walla Walla.

"Thy Brother's Wife," by Andrew Greeley, is the story of two brothers—one a senator, the other a

priest—who each, in their own way, love the same woman.

"No Bad Dogs: The Woodhouse Way," by Barbara Woodhouse, is a good, down-to-earth humorous advice on training dogs by a British expert whose dog training television is one of England's most popular programs.
