Sandy Baptist welcomes pastor

There may be a world of difference between a metropolis like Chicago and a small community like Sandy, but new Sandy Baptist Church pastor Fred Vogel sees no need to change his message when he takes over the local church this Sunday.

"I want to carry on with the Bible being applied to daily living," he said. "The more I was able to carry that on, I found that people are interested in that."

Vogel, 36, will preach his first sermon this Sunday at the 11 a.m. service on "God's Plan for Our Church." A potluck will follow the service.

The day will conclude with a 6 p.m. service and visit from Dr. Larry McCracken, director of the Conservative Baptist Churches of Oregon.

The new pastor is busy now getting acquainted with members of his new church and the community. He plans to speak with local service groups to get a grip on the pulse of Sandy.

"I really want to get acquainted, not only at the church, but I really want to get acquainted with all the people in town. First of all I want to find out where I am," he said.

Vogel replaces pastor Ed Grable, who served in Sandy for a dozen years, and brings with him a commitment to family-oriented service.

"In the past I've had a strong emphasis on family-type seminars like marriage enrichment," he said. "My wife, Mary, has conducted seminars for the women on being a woman, wife and mother."

"We'll have things like that definitely," he added. "We want to have that emphasis."

Vogel began his pastoral ministry in Pecatonica, Ill., where he served for eight years before moving to Chicago. He has a bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois and received his theological training at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School in Deerfield, Ill.

"We have really been received warmly in Sandy," he said. "The people at the church and in town have been very friendly."

"My wife and I really appreciate that kind of welcome. We're looking forward to spending a long time here and having a strong emphasis on Bible and family."

The Vogels, who are renting a home in Sandy while they wait to sell their Chicago home, have five children, Matthew, 11, Michael, 10, Joy, 7, Melody, 4, and Jonathon, three months—the Vogels' "original Oregonian," he said.

Child care listing begins

Sandy-area parents looking for long- or short-term care for their children on short notice now have a new resource to tap.

Clackamas Family and Child Care Information Service has available an information and referral service covering available sources of child care throughout Clackamas County.

The service is designed to make the search for readily available child care easier.

"With the high rate of unemployment, particularly in several rural areas of Clackamas County, this service is essential because parents, often on short notice, don't know where they can leave their children," said Leilani Pennel, information and referral coordinator.

The purpose of this service is to provide each parent or guardian with information on specific child care resources available to them, including all registered family day care homes and centers, some unregistered homes, preschools and kindergartens and other care centers.

The service, available by calling 657-3007, will operate from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. every week day to provide information for care of children from six weeks to 12 years old.

Varying types of arrangements will be available, ranging from one hour up to 24 hours a day, including weekends and holidays.

Parents who need care in the county may get information about child care in their area, an idea of average costs and licensing requirements by calling

the telephone number.

Providers of child care in Clackamas County who have not already been contacted and wish to have their names included in this free listing service are also encouraged to call.

Those are the questions Calvin Trillin asks in "Uncivil Liberties," now available at Sandy Public

Library. If laughter really is therapeutic, it's time to toss away those pills and take a whopping dose of Trillin.

Also new at the library is a real sizzler of a spy book, "The Brink" by N.J. Crisp.

Two British agents are forced by their loathsome boss into reluctant alliance after they are both suspected as traitors. If the concept of "launch on warning" hasn't already chilled a reader's bones, "The Brink" will.

Someone once asked Stephen King if horror stories are all he writes. The answer is in his new book of four short stories offered in one large package.

In "Different Seasons," King proves his ability to write just good stories. The kind brand of driving narrative, and graphically rendered scenes and characters are all here, with just a touch of the nightmarish elements that remind the reader that this is Stephen King at his best.

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Sandy man's lilies garner top prizes

A Sandy man recently won two prestigious awards in the 35th Annual International Lily Show in St. Paul, Minn.

Ed McRae, representing Oregon Bulb Farms, won the Michigan Lily Society award and the North American Lily Society Director's Award for the best trumpet-shaped hybrid lily in the show.

The awards were both given for the stem of

"Black Dragon," a white lily with a yellow throat and dark purple back side to the petals of the flowers.

Each lily entry is judged against both a "standard of excellence" for that particular lily and the quality of the other entries.

The lily show is an annual event in which lily enthusiasts from around the world come to exhibit, look at, and learn about lilies.

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
