Speaker set at church

After four years in Ivory Coast, West Africa, Mr. and Mrs. Terry Burns are planning to return as church planting missionaries with the Conservative Baptist Foreign Mission Society. Burns will speak about his work at the Pleasant Home Baptist Church, 32120 Dodge Park Boulevard, Gresham, on Aug. 29 at 11 a.m.

The Burns' first term was spent teaching in a school for missionary children. When they returned to the states he began a ministry as interim pastor at the First Baptist Church of Caldwell, Idaho.

He was granted a leave of absence from CBFMS and resigned several months later in order to continue at the church.

During their second year in Caldwell the Burns' experienced a growing desire to return to Ivory Coast. In order to prepare for a discipleship and evangelism ministry overseas, Burns sought further education.

In 1981 he completed his masters studies at the Western Conservative Baptist Seminary in Portland.

He is currently enrolled in the doctor of ministry degree program at the same school. Previously he had received a bachelor of science degree in education from the University of Idaho in Moscow.

While in Ivory Coast, Burns became aware of the need for trained church leaders. "Once I was listening to an Ivorian church leader as he shared his desire to evangelize the people of his town.

"At that time, I realized the need for trained Ivorian pastors and desired to work with these men."

Corbett woman, 94, dies

Annie Laurie Benfield Zeek of Corbett died at a local hospital Aug. 20 at the age of 94.

Mrs. Zeek was born Annie Laurie Benfield on May 13, 1888 at Corbett. As a child she moved to Canada, where she started school.

She spent her early 20s in Canada, then returned to Corbett where she finished her education.

On Aug. 21, 1928 at Corbett she married Orland Zeek. Both families were of pioneer stock, and they lived to see the land their families settled develop into a community.

She was a charter member of the Columbia Grange (over 75 years) and a member of the Corbett Pioneer Association.

She attended the Church of Christ in Gresham.

Mrs. Zeek was a homemaker and a nurse. She was interested in history and was an accomplished storyteller, with many of her stories based in fact.

Her hobby was gardening, and she liked to cook and can. In her home days, canned things were her staple. Quilting was another hobby, and she like to travel, play the organ, and write letters.

At the age of 94 she and her family had a picnic on the banks of the Sandy River at Troutdale.

She was the last of her clan, though many nieces, nephews and members of the Benfield family survive.

Services were held Tuesday. Interment was at the Mt. View Cemetery in Corbett.
