Hoodland customers face rate hike

The first round of hearings that could lead to increased telephone bills for Hoodland residents gets underway next Tuesday in Salem. The public utility commissioner has scheduled a prehearing conference on a request by Continental Telephone Co. of the Northwest to increase local phone rates in its Oregon service territories. The conference will be held at 1:30 p.m. in Hearing Room D of the Labor & Industries Building. In March, Continental submitted a proposal to increase annual revenues by \$1.9 million which would raise local residential and business rates by varying amounts for customers. Public Utility Commissioner John Lobdell suspended the proposal in April for study by the PUC staff. The purpose of Tuesday's prehearing conference is to identify persons who wish to become intervenors in the case and to set dates for public hearings, if necessary. Hearings Officer Lowell Bergen will conduct the conference on behalf of Lobdell.

Teens to explore photography

Camera Connection in Sandy will sponsor a new Explorer Scouts post this fall for local teenagers who are interested in learning more about photography. He will be assisted by other Explorer advisors Steve Wolf and Dennis Dries, also local photographers.
