Free lunch criteria told by schools

School begins Tuesday for most area schools and officials are finalizing last-minute details, including qualifications for free and reduced-price meals for children unable to pay the full price under the National School Lunch Program.

The Sandy Elementary District will charge 80 cents for meals for students in grades 1-6 and 90 cents for students in grades 7 and 8. Reduced prices for qualifying students will be 40 cents per meal.

In the Welches School District, lunches will be 65 cents apiece, if purchased in books of 28 tickets at a time. Otherwise, lunches will be 70 cents per meal. Milk will be 15 cents.

In the Cottrell School District, lunches will be 60 cents a day for students through fourth grade, \$3 per week or \$10.20 a month. For fifth through eighth graders, lunches will be 75 cents daily, \$3.75 weekly or \$12.75 on a monthly basis.

Application forms for the free and reduced-price meals will be distributed to all parents and are available at school offices.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for the benefits. If families

have foster children living with them and wish to apply for such meals for them, they should contact the local school administrator.

Under the provisions of the policy, principals at Sandy Elementary District school will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent wishes to make a formal appeal, he may make a request to Superintendent Clark Lund, 39065 Pleasant St., or 668-5541, for a hearing to appeal the decision.

In the Welches district, Superintendent Kenneth Blackburn will review applications and determine eligibility. Appeals will be made to Richard Hoffman, Star Route, Rhododendron, or 622-3165, for a hearing to appeal the decision.

Cottrell Superintendent Jean Lundy will review applications and determine eligibility in that school district. Appeals will be made to Judy Lenchitsky, 34231 SE Bluff Road, Boring, or 663-5745.

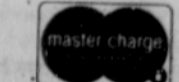
