

## Area people fare well at fair

A number of area people received awards at the 1982 Oregon State Fair.

In the 4-H senior horse showmanship contest Kim Swanson of Boring received a premier performer award. Susan Murphy of Boring and Tracie Ruple of Eagle Creek received blue ribbons.

In the commercial wines division the Big Fir Winery of Boring received a bronze award for its Marion Blackberry sparkling wine.

In poultry competition, Bebe Paul of Boring had best of breed with mini lop rabbits.

In Future Farmer of America competition, Tana Nonamaker of Sandy had the grand champion female in registered spotted hogs. She also had the grand and reserve champions in the junior female division, and the reserve champion in the mature female division.

In FFA sheep, Robin Johnson of Sandy had the breed champion in ram grade hampshires. She had the reserve grand champion in dorset showman competition, and won a blue award in Hampshire ram, and red awards in

dorset ram and dorset ewe lamb.

Hal and Dolores Vrooman, showing north country cheviots, had premier breeder, champion ewe, reserve champion ram, spring ram lamb, pair of ram lambs, pair of yearling ewes, spring ewe lamb, pair of ewe lambs, young flock and get-of-sire. In addition, they won the Oregon State Fair Special Award for Oregon bred and owned get-of-sire.

The Vroomans also had the columbia pair of yearling ewes.

In 4-H duroc classes, Ted Reynolds of Boring was reserve champion with his March-May gilt.

In FFA beef cattle showing, Knapp Angus of Sandy had the grand champion heifer, the early summer yearling heifer and the intermediate champion heifer.

In the All American Horse Show, Thomas Crown and Connie Tuor of Boring, representing Rising Star Stables, won the Green Working Hunters open class and under saddle class. Cotillions Beau and Wendy Sanetel, both of Boring, won the \$500 Trail

Horses Championship Stake.

Oregon 4-H members currently have about 100 puppies in their homes, dogs that are being trained for Guide Dogs for the Blind Inc.

Among those returning a puppy to California for final training was Kathy Beckman of Sandy.

Angie Conibear of Boring was one of two champions in the third and final 4-H mini-meal contest.

Conibear topped the intermediate class with her effort in preparing a cheesy meatloaf. She received a special award from the Oregon CowBelles.

Conibear also received a blue ribbon in the 4-H food preparation contest.

In addition, Conibear was among those receiving special awards from the Oregon Sheep Growers Auxiliary for outstanding wool garments.

Clackamas County 4-H members swept the top places in the dairy cattle judging contest. Ami Aschoff of Boring took champion individual honors in the senior contest.

Lori Aschoff of Boring was one of the top individuals in intermediate competition.

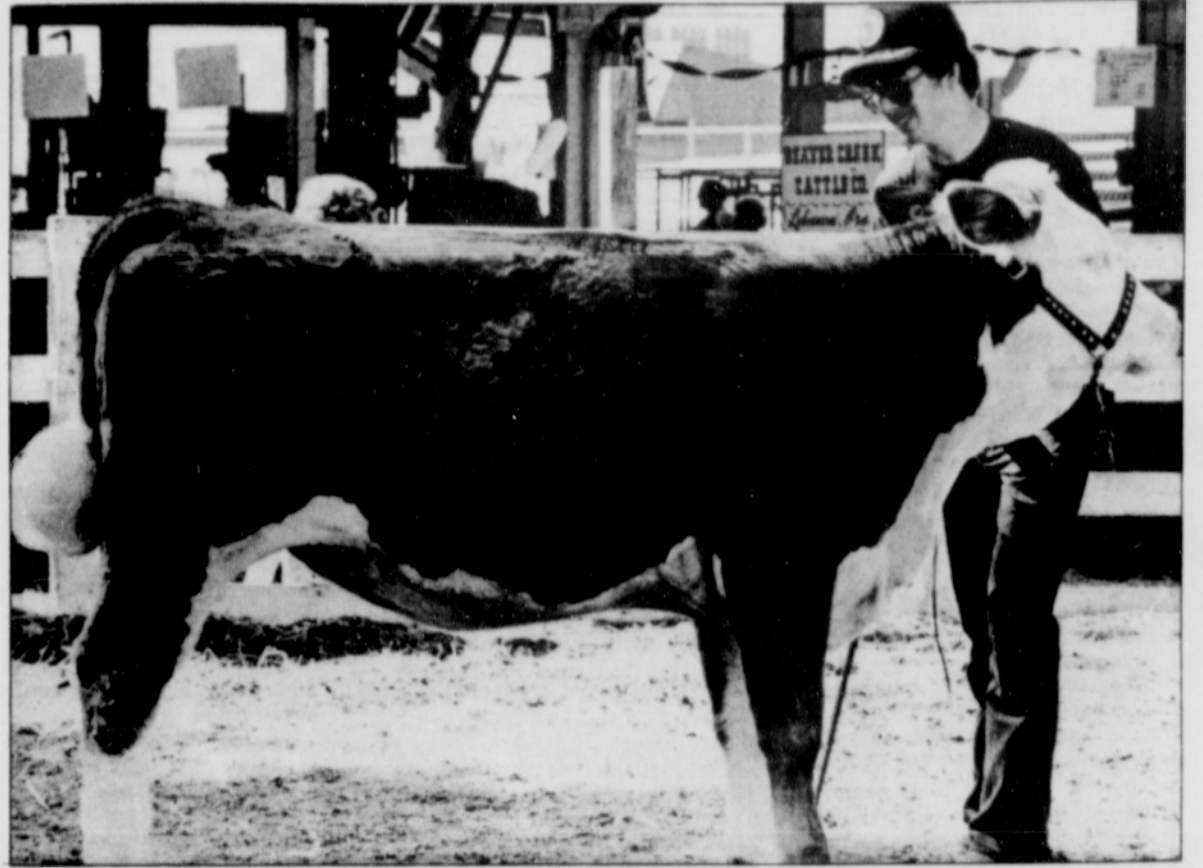
Lori Aschoff of Boring also had the junior guernsey heifer calf.

## Cycle mishap results in injury

Two persons were injured Labor Day night when the 1966 Harley Davidson motorcycle they were riding crashed into a traffic sign at Highway 26 and Sleepy Hollow Drive.

The driver, Frederick Douglas Jones, 34, of Kelso, Wash., was seriously injured in the crash. An unidentified female passenger riding on the back of the motorcycle suffered only a scratched knee, according to Hoodland Fire Chief Don Armintrout.

Fred Barmore of the Oregon State Police said Jones was traveling west on Highway 26 at a high speed. OSP trooper Lyle Swartz was eastbound when he tracked him on radar.

As Swartz turned around to chase Jones, the motorcyclist allegedly turned off his headlights, turned onto Sleepy Hollow Lane and struck the traffic control sign.

Barmore said he could not say whether Jones was attempting to elude.

Swartz said Barmore, lost sight of Jones and passed by the area once or twice before seeing the accident.

Jones sustained massive head and abdominal injuries in the accident. He was taken to Gresham Community Hospital where he was listed in critical condition.

On Monday a hospital spokesperson said Jones' condition had not changed.

## Water customers may stop the boiling

Customers of the Lady Creek water system may quit boiling their water, according to the health division of the Oregon Department of Human Resources.

The water system serves 406 summer homes on government land between Rhododendron and Government Camp.

For the "interim protection of the public health," the health division recommended in March of 1981 that residents boil water until system improvements could be made to provide

safe water. That recommendation has been lifted.

Two wells and a redwood storage reservoir have been put in place, inspected and the water tested.

We "believe that the system improvements made have eliminated the health hazards and that the boil water advisory may be lifted at this time," wrote Dave Leland, regional engineer, in a letter to Preston Adkins, president of the Lady Creek water system.

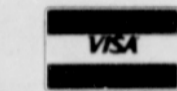
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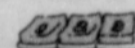
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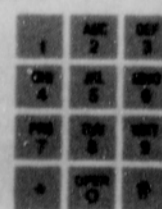
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
