QUESTION: Shall a new tax base of \$10,112,499 be authorized for maintaining educational programs at Mt. Hood Community College? PURPOSE: Mt. Hood Community College offers vocational, lower division transfer, and continuing education courses to more than 20,000 adult students each year at a cost per student less than the state average for community colleges and public schools. These programs are financed by state aid, student tuition and fees, local property taxes, and other sources. The college's current tax base authority of \$6,731,707 is not sufficient to meet current program needs, despite significant increases in tuition and fees, because of increased costs and reduced state aid. Enrollment has stabilized. The new tax base will permit existing programs to continue at present levels.

Postmaster explains commemorative stamps

Did you ever wonder how subjects are selected for those colorful U.S. postage stamps—those miniature art pieces which adorn letters of all types and sizes?

According to Sandy Postmaster Arnold Becker, all it takes is a letter between the suggester and the Postmaster General who has the authority by law to issue stamps.

There are no mandatory forms nor prescribed format to follow when proposing a stamp subject, according to Becker. Just a let-

ter setting forth the proposal in some detail will do.

There are a few guidelines, however, which should be kept in mind when submitting stamp ideas. For example, living persons can't appear as subjects on U.S. postage stamps. In order to be honored on a commemorative, a person must be dead for 10 years or longer. The only exception is a memorial stamp issued in honor of a recently-deceased U.S. president.

Only times and events of national appeal and significance are chosen. Stamps are not issued to honor fraternal, political, sectarian or service organizations, Becker pointed out, and they don't endorse commercial enterprises nor advertise specific products.

Each year, thousands of stamp proposals are submitted to the U.S. Postal Service. All suggestions are routed to the 17-member Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee,

selected by the Postmaster General, which reviews and narrows down the proposals. The committee meets at least six times a year and recommends 15 to 20 stamp subjects annually. The committee's job is no easy task since each suggestion submitted—no matter how unusual—must be considered, Becker said.

After a subject has been approved by the Postmaster General, production begins. Selecting the appropriate time and place of issue. The printing

process is a mammoth job. An average print run of a commemorative stamp is about 165 million stamps.

With those thoughts in mind and "National Card and Letter Writing Week" at hand, Sept. 19-25, now may be the perfect time to submit those ideas, the local postmaster pointed out.
