

# Group seeks annexation into fire district

For the second time in two years a group of property owners near Welches have requested their property be annexed into the Hoodland Rural Fire Protection District.

The area is square-shaped and bordered by U.S. Forest Service land on the south and east, and private land on the north and west. It covers roughly 640 acres, south of Highway 26, and is located near the junction of Salmon River Road and Welches Road.

Known as Section 16 on official maps, it has 18 single-family dwellings with an estimated population totaling 30 persons. If annexed, it would provide about \$1,700 of additional operating funds for the district.

At the fire district's last board of directors meeting, held on Sept. 14, annexation to insure adequate fire protection for the area was made. The request originally came before the board last year, but was tabled.

According to Hoodland Fire Chief Don Armintrout, the Government Camp area was in the process of being annexed at the time of the original request, and the board felt it best to put further expansion of the fire district "on the back burner."

"We didn't want the people to get worried about land-grabbing," said Armintrout.

Armintrout told the board he is in favor of the request and, due to the proximity, it could be served by the department. If annexed, he said the true cash value of the district would increase, but the taxpayers would be paying less.

"Why it wasn't included in the original formation of the fire district," said Armintrout, "I don't know."

Lowell Njust, fire district attorney and a property owner in the area, is one of the supporters of the request. Njust said the people of Section 16 had believed they were part of the fire district and were paying for the service.

"We didn't know we weren't in it," said Njust. The fire board voted unanimously to proceed with the annexation.

## Auction for McFarland a 'success'

A fund-raising auction Sunday netted Ruth McFarland, Democratic candidate for the 5th Congressional District, \$1,039.

McFarland, a Boring resident who teaches science at Mt. Hood Community College, is raising funds to aid her in her quest of the Congressional seat held by incumbent Republican Denny Smith. The auction was held at the Mt. Hood Lions Club in Wemme and was conducted by Bill Anton of Oregon City, who filled in as auctioneer.

The event attracted over a 150 persons who "silently" bid on a wide range of items that were donated by supporters of McFarland. Such things as an airplane ride over Mount St. Helens, a weekend at the coast, bales of hay and dinner with McFarland. Transportation to the latter is reportedly going to be provided via a 1930 Model A Ford.

Among those in attendance were Robert Shiprack of Beaver Creek, a Democratic candidate for House District 23. He bid \$38 for two pairs of Nike shoes donated by former U.S. Transportation Secretary and former Portland Mayor Neil Goldschmidt.

Juanita Orr, a Democratic from Lake Grove who is running for Clackamas County clerk, bid on two lambs. Having no pickup available, she hauled her \$19 and \$27 acquaintances home in the back of her car.

Entertainment was provided by Marie Kennedy, a singer-guitarist from Brightwood. Toward the end of the festivities she was joined by McFarland at the microphone, where they sang a few songs together.

Steve Scheer, Clackamas County campaign coordinator for McFarland, called the event a success. He praised the efforts of Jo Beth Anderson, of Sandy, who coordinated the auction.

Scheer said McFarland has placed great emphasis on conducting a "grass roots" campaign in the county. He said she has particularly strong support in the Sandy-Mt. Hood area.
