

Area people participate in Mountain Festival

Artists and artisans from Mt. Hood and the surrounding foothills joined in for two days of demonstrations and displays this weekend at the Wy'East Day Lodge at Timberline.

Participants in the "Mountain People Festival" were from the Sandy-Mt. Hood area, as well as from Hood River, Estacada and Boring. Even a few former mountain people were on hand displaying wares.

The crafts were displayed on the first and second floors of the day lodge. The displays included stained glass works, quilts, ceramics, weavings, photography, paintings and jewelry.

The Hedum family of Boring operate a unique business out of their home. They were there in full force selling their unusual products, which include wine jellies and honey soaps, made with the help of 1,800,000 bees.

Jan Hedum and her husband, Al, and their four children, Dana, Karol, Jenny and Ginger, combine their talents in beekeeping, crafts, and wine and jam-making to form "Thatsmy

Honey."

The family products are sold in rustic cedar and redwood crates, which accent their homemade labels. Generally these are topped off with some type of handmade lace decoration.

In a photography exhibit sponsored by Camera Connection of Sandy was a number of pictures from local residents. The works of Doug Palmblad, Loren Nibble, Dennis Dries, Steve Slaboda and Chuck Coleman captured some of the natural elegance of the mountain.

Donna Weisenfluh McQueen, an artist and former resident of the mountain area who has lived in Sandy, Rhodendron, Brightwood and Welches, displayed her works.

McQueen, who grew up in Pleasant Valley and Happy Valley, paints primarily wild flowers, landscapes and historical structures using watercolors, oils, pastels and acrylics.

She and her family have spent five summers working on the Mt. Hood and Gifford Pinchot National Forest lookouts, so it is no surprise that much of her subject matter is the wilderness itself.

Demonstrations on mountain climbing were presented by Jim C. Swartzell and Terry Kent, both of Brightwood, who were assisted by Ron and Joellen Kipp of Welches.

Included was a repelling demonstration off the balcony of the day lodge. They also showed how to

use various climbing apparatus.

The demonstration and display, which reportedly attracted a large crowd almost continuously, was put together "at the spur of the moment," explained Swartzell. He said when he learned that mountaineering was not going to be represented he contacted

Kent and the Kipps and hurriedly put together the display.

In addition to the mountaineering exhibit, Swartzell brought along his slides and maps, which he uses in his sailboat charter service conducting trips around the San Juans and Gulf Islands in Washington.

Tom Iraci, information

specialist with the U.S. Forest Service, presented a number of multi-image slide shows. They featured Timberline Trail as well as the craft work of the lodge.

Entertainment was provided by guitarist-singer Will Frank of Welches, The Sandy Community Players and The Lumber Jacks and Jills of Estacada.

CITY OF SANDY, OREGON

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on Tuesday, November 2, 1982 there will be submitted to the legal voters of the City of Sandy a Special Election to be held in conjunction with the General Election, within the corporate boundaries of the City of Sandy, Oregon, for their approval or rejection a certain question, the ballot title of which is designated as follows:

ESTABLISHING A NEW TAX BASE FOR THE CITY OF SANDY

QUESTION: Shall the City of Sandy establish a new tax base of \$460,000 effective in fiscal year 1983-84?

EXPLANATION: This measure, which would be partially State financed if approved, will authorize the City of Sandy to increase its tax base from the current \$14,142.56 to \$460,000.00, to be effective for fiscal year 1983-84, which commences July 1, 1983. Article XI, Section 11 of the Oregon Constitution limits annual increases in a tax base to the preceding year's tax base plus six percent. The current tax base is not adequate to maintain City services.

BE IT RESOLVED that Tuesday, November 2, 1982, between the hours of 8:00 o'clock a.m. and 8:00 o'clock p.m., is designated the time for holding the election for the purpose of voting on the measure.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that said election shall be conducted by the Clackamas County Election Department, which department shall establish polling places, precincts, and election boards for said election.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the precincts for the election shall be and constitute all the territory included within the corporate limits of the City of Sandy.
