Veteran newspaper man dies



Jack Travis

John Hunt "Jack" Travis of Sandy, retired newspaper publisher and Bonneville Power Administration employee, died Oct. 29 in a Portland hospital. He was 73.

He published two weekly newspapers, the Bonneville Dam Chronicle in Cascade Locks and the Hood River Sun in Hood River, for 25 years.

He served on the Hood River Port Commission and helped lead the commission's efforts to purchase the Hood River-White Salmon bridge across the Columbia River.

He was past president of the Oregon Press Association and the Oregon Council on Public Broadcasting. He also was a former member of the Oregon State Fair Commission.

Locally, Mr. Travis was a member of the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd, a Sandy Community Players sponsor, a Mt. Hood Community College "Saint," and a local adviser to the governor's ombudsman for inspection of nursing homes for the aged.

Mr. Travis was born in Portland, the son of former Oregonian City Editor John L. Travis and Myrtle Hunt.

He graduated from the University of Washington with a degree in forestry. In 1965, he began a 16-year stint with BPW as a forestry technician and was responsible for securing easements for acquiring rights-of-way for transmission lines. Later his duties included environmental concerns for the agency.

A longtime associate of the late Sen. Wayne Morse, Mr. Travis was active in political affairs and toyed with the idea of running for a local seat in the state Legislature. He helped to organize the Wayne Morse Historical Park Corp., which participated in turning the Wayne Morse Ranch in Eugene into a public park.

He was a breeder of Devon cattle and raised purebred Puli dogs at his ranch near Sandy.

Survivors include a daughter, Linn Hiatt of Portland; a son, John H. Travis II of The Dalles, and one grandson.

Memorial services were held Wednesday at the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd in Sandy.

Joan Brian

Services for Joan Brian of Sandy were held Tuesday at Zeller Chapel of Roses in Portland. She died Oct. 30 in a Portland hospital. She was 69.

Born Aug. 25, 1913 in Duncan, British Columbia, she had been an Oregon resident since 1937 and had lived in Sandy since 1973.

A homemaker, Mrs. Brian belonged to Chat'n'Chew, a local neighborhood group.

She is survived by her husband, Lawson G. Brian of Sandy; two

daughters, Louise Laws in California and Barbara Vargo in Ohio; a son, Lawson G. Brian III of Sandy; three sisters, Louise Moxley in Oklahoma, Flora Hallinan of Washington, and Anne Lazarus of Klamath Falls; five grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

Private interment was at Gethsemani Cemetery in Portland.

The family suggests that memorial contributions be made in her name to Providence Medical Center, in care of Father Novak.

Steve Giuntini

A Brightwood man was killed Sunday in Des Plaines, Ill., when his car struck a telephone pole.

Dead is Steve Giuntini, 35, a carpenter who had worked for the Oregon Trail Construction company building custom and kit log homes. Most recently he sub-contracted work and built the play equipment at Welches Grade School.

In September, Giuntini won the bid to repair the drainage problems in the play area next to the school's new addition.

Born Aug. 27, 1947 in Chicago, he graduated from Northern Illinois University in 1971. He had previously served in the U.S. Marine Corps in Vietnam from 1966 to 1969.

Mr. Giuntini had made his home in Brightwood for the past seven years.

He is survived by his wife, Marilyn of Brightwood; two daughters, Heather and Allison, of the family home; his parents, Geri and Edward Giuntini of Illinois; a sister, Susan Walker of Illinois, and a brother, Edward Giuntini of Illinois.

Funeral services were held Wednesday in Mount Prospect, Ill. Burial was a Memory Garden Cemetery in Arlington Heights, Ill.

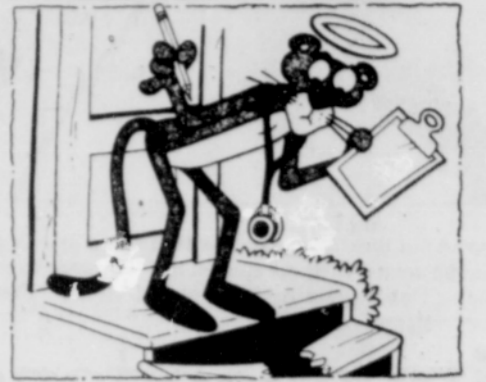

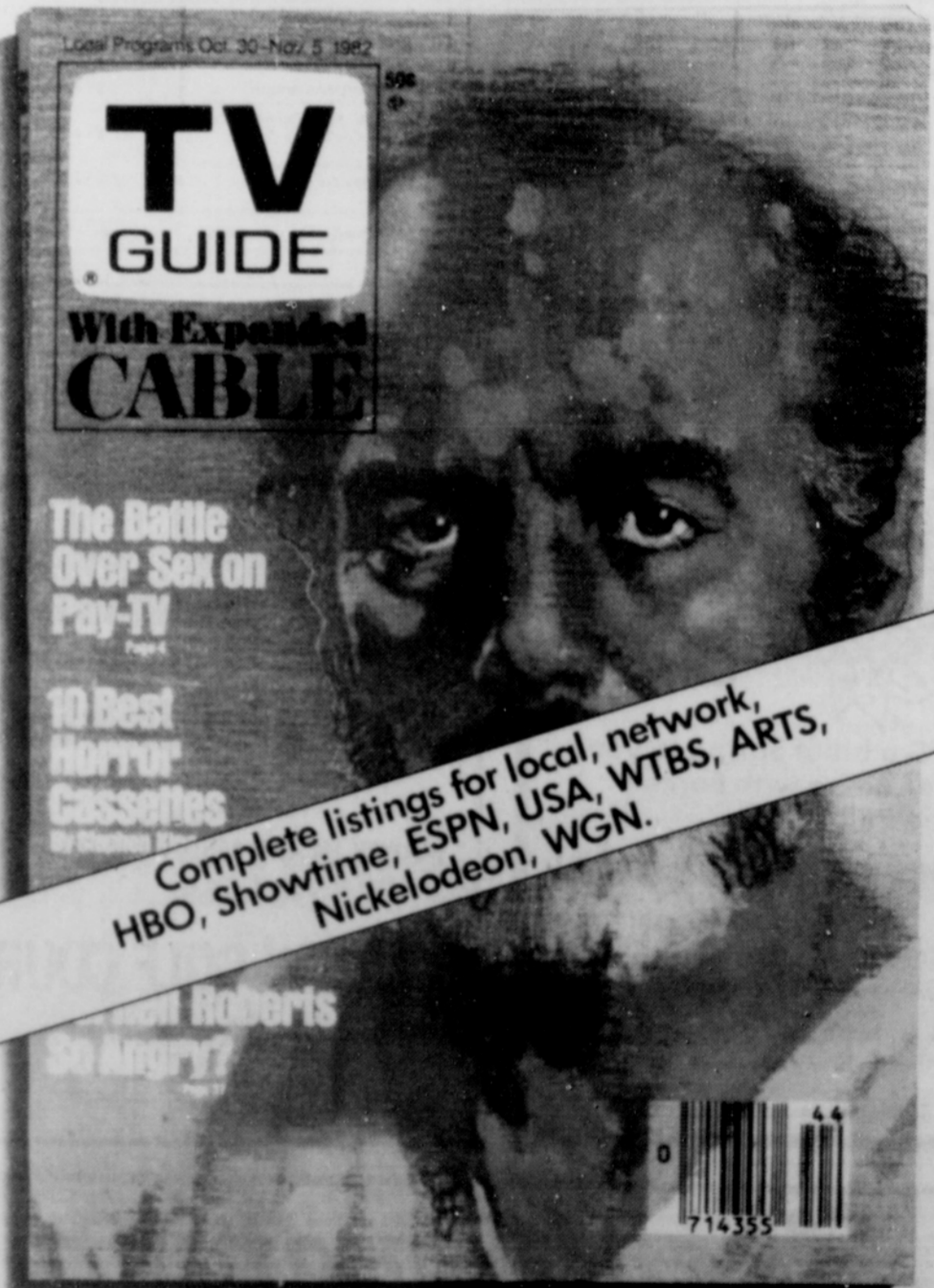
