Seminar to deal with care of old

A one-day seminar will be held at the Sandy Community Center Nov. 20 from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. that will deal with caring for someone who is getting older.

According to Dr. Ann Blues, executive director of the non-profit Institute for Health Care Education Inc., the program will be

available for any friend, relative or professional caring for someone who is getting older, whether in one's home or a nursing home.

Cost for the program and all materials is \$20. Participants should register by Nov. 16. Registration forms are available at the Com-

munity Center.

Blues said the intent of the program is to keep people "as independent as possible in their own homes."

Topics to be covered include keeping elders alive and independent, changes in memory, mood, sexuality, learning and personality, the impact on the fami-

ly, financial and community resources, options for care and stress in those that provide care.

Play at Welches to open

Welches Grade School will present an adaption of Robert Lewis Stevenson's classic, "Treasure Island," in three performances scheduled for Nov. 4, 5 and 8.

The play, written in 1881, will be presented by Jeanine Boldt's drama class. It will feature 24 seventh and eighth grade students who, in addition to the acting, made their own scenery and costumes.

Boldt said the play will "stray a little" from Stevenson's original plot, but stressed the Welches rendition will not detract from the element of mystery and adventure.

"In the original version the women remained home and tended to the house, but this time they help after the treasure," said Boldt.

Gary Dietterich, vice

principal, said the play is free to the public and will highlight nine weeks of work the students have invested in the elective course. The play will run about an hour and a half,

including intermission. Friday night parents and other interested persons can attend the main performance of "Treasure Island." Curtain time is 7:30 p.m.


