

# Cinder Hawks take state title

Six of the seven Cinder Hawk teams entered in the Oregon State A.A.U.-T.A.C. Junior Olympics Saturday at Beaverton came home with trophies.

Many of the youngsters participating attend Bull Run School. Others are from various East County schools.

Iseal Matz finished an unbeaten season by out-kicking "the best from Eugene," according to Coach Darold Beymer.

He had a winning time of 8:44 over a "wet" 2000 meters in the 7 and under boys competition.

Andy Norman and Blaine Caudle contributed third- and fourth-place finishes, respectively, to contribute to a team state championship.

A second 7 and under team took second for the Hawks, with Ben Matz, Andy Schneider and Travis Romey finishing fifth, sixth and seventh, respectively.

Gracie Pankey, "coming on like gang busters in the late season, was again outstanding," said Beymer. She led the 7 and under girls to a second

place with a second-place finish.

Karessa Francis took a best-ever fourth, with Shannon Schneider 11th and Christy Hartney 12th.

The Hawks' 11 and 12 year old girls, led by Nichole Galvin, Danielle Jordan and Karla Harrison, went to Beaverton with "definite plans of winning the state championship," according to Beymer.

And they did just that. Shawna Patterson, "one of our strongest runners," was in trouble early with a hip pointer, but teammates Galvin, Jordan and Harrison placed fifth, sixth and seventh out of a pack of 50 runners to compensate. Kim Yankauskas (the youngest member of the top five) was "absolutely wonderful, passing more people than I could count as she took 14th."

Patterson ended up in 28th place, far below her norm, and Angel Bean was 45th.

"It was a marvelous team win as we were 22 points better than second-place Roseburg, even with

all our problems," said Beymer.

Angela Benedetti turned in on of her "most brilliant runs with a kick that carried her just short of first place as she led the team to second in torrid competition in the 13-14 girls division."

Benedetti ran the 4000-meter course in 16:05. Shaune Gilchrist and Cindy Roth "were great" in fourth and fifth, while Robin Ermatinger was 18th, and Corky Pones 26th.

"It's great to think that four out of the five will come back in the same age group again next year," Beymer said.

Audrey Krause led the 10 and under girls to a third-place finish, taking seventh "with another fine run."

Beymer said, "I was again impressed by first-year runner Ruth Romey," who finished ninth. Rosey Pankey was 11th, and last year's state champion, Michele Gatchell, running with a cast on one arm,

could only manage 12th. Halo Bean rounded out the top five in 21st, while Trish Waibel was 22nd and Cody Proctor 26th.

The 11-12 boys were out of the trophy range, in fourth place. Brandon Shore was 20th, Tom Romey 22nd, Larry Little 26th, James Scott 29th and Jason King 30th.

Mart9 Romey picked up a medal in the 10 and under boys competition with a 10th-place finish. Ron Caudle was 13th.

Adam Ermatinger was fourth in the 15-16 boys division.

With seven teams entered, the Hawks took two firsts, three seconds, one third and one fourth. "I don't think that was a bad day," Beymer said. "The kids won 19 medals."

Some members will compete in Canada this weekend. The weekend after next they'll compete in the Regional Junior Olympics at Ephrata, Wash.

## Steelheads to play for title on Nov. 13

The Oregon City Steelheads and the Washington County Grizzlies, members of the Northwest Football Alliance, will meet to decide the league championship Nov. 13 at Portland's Civic Stadium.

The Steelheads finished the regular season with an overall record of 12-0, which includes a 31-9 win over the Grizzlies in the season opener.

The Grizzlies have a lot of ex-Oregon City players on the roster, including starting quarterback Geoff

Said Kim Johns, Oregon City coach, "It's impossible for them (the Grizzlies) to get fired up enough to beat us. They keep talking, talking and talking, but, do you know what? They're all talk and no action."

Steenison, according to an Oregon City press release, said, "Half the players on our team played last year for the Steelheads, and we didn't like Kim Johns. We still don't."

Three Sandy Union High School graduates, Allen Fry, Cal McKinnis Sr. and Cal McKinnis Jr. play for the Steelheads.
