## Skipper, Kearney led Pioneer football team

The Pioneers started out the 1982 campaign with a new offensive line and quarterback. Close games, but loses nonetheless, against The Dalles, Parkrose and Centennial kept the season from being as successful as Coach Greg O'Meara and crew would have liked.

Sandy ended up 4-5 overall, 3-5 in the Mt. Hood Conference. A fun 29-12 win over Reynolds, the last game of the season, allowed the Pioneers to end the season on a good note. A mud wrestling match afterward involving O'Meara and several seniors marked the end of what could at least be considered an interesting season.

Chuck Kearney, a 5-11 and 195-pound senior, rushed for a whopping 1,320 yards on 246 carries, good for a 5.4 yard per carry average. He also scored 10 touchdowns.

As football fans know, Scott Skipper, a 6-2 and 200-pound senior fullback, did a lot of the blocking. But Skipper, also a track standout, ran for 427 yards on 81 carries, good for a 5.3 yards per carry average. He scored four touchdowns.

Others to contribute in the backfield were senior Bill Bowman, who gained 12 yards on four carries, sophomore Brent Kearney, who gained 38 yards on 12 carries, Mark Tinjum, who gained 14 yards on two carries, and junior Ryan Coombs, who gained 50 yards on 12 carries.

Senior Gordon Brinser completed 31 of 78 passes for 392 yards and two touchdowns. Brinser also

ran in one touchdown. Chuck Kearney completed three of four for 81 yards and two touchdowns.

Senior Todd Byron caught 18 of those passes for 230 yards and three touchdowns. Tinjum caught five for 96 yards. Chuck Kearney caught two for 17 yards. Senior Russell Fork caught four for 65 yards. Senior Mo Contreras caught one for four yards.

All in all, the Pioneers passed for 473 yards and rushed for another 1,826.

Opponents gained 765 yards in the air to 1,402 on the ground.

Skipper punted 26 times for 690 yards, with an average of 26.5. Brent Kearney averaged 38.6 yards, having kicked off 29 times for 1,119 yards.

On defense, Skipper, a linebacker, made almost 11 tackles a game, with a high of 18 against Reynolds.

Junior Frank McKinnis averaged over eight tackles per outing, and senior Pat Baird averaged almost nine.

Brinser averaged five tackles a game, and also nabbed six interceptions during the season.

Other leading tacklers, and their average per game, include Terry Lind, 3.4; Byron, 4.2; Jim Morgan, 5.2; Bowman, 3.6; Chuck Kearney, 5.2; Russell Fork, 1.4; Mark Shelton, 4; Joe Betschart, 5.4; Mark Tinjum, 3.1; Mike Marleau, 4.8; Troy Schmidt, 2.8; Bob Wantowski, 5.2; Steve Pettingill, 2.8; Doug Rathke, 3.8.

Wantowski had the most quarterback sacks with three.

## Romey 15th at AAA state meet

SUHS junior Sam Romey, a two-time district cross country champion, finished 15th at the AAA state cross country meet Saturday in Eugene.

Senior Brian Reick finished 68th. He ran the course at Lane Community College in 17:09. There were 143 runners competing.

In addition, Reick finished ahead of two runners that beat him last week at the district cross country championships, where he placed sixth with a time of 16:29, a personal record.

Romey ran the 5000 meters in 16:10.7 Saturday, also missing a personal record. According to Coach Scott McMullen, there weren't many personal records because of the weather.

He reports it was "very cold," foggy and windy.

Reick and Romey were lined up in an inside position, and the runners on the inside were kind of boxed in, according to McMullen. "That's not an excuse," he said,

but added that the front runners may have had a 40-yard advantage by the time Romey got into the open.

Romey turned in a 5:03 first mile. "Not bad," said McMullen, considering there was one uphill corner in the first mile where he had to do an "almost shuffle-step jog" while waiting to make the turn.

Romey and Centennial sophomore Rob Collins ran to photo finishes in a Pioneer-Eagle dual and at the district meet, but Collins was 28th Saturday, running the course in 16:31.2.

Romey was 28th in state as a sophomore.

Tom Sera of Beaverton, who defeated Romey going away at the first of the season, finished three seconds ahead of him at the state meet.

McMullen said Romey didn't know Sera was immediately in front of him when he finished. It wasn't until he looked at the final results that he discovered he possibly could have avenged the earlier loss, according to McMullen.

Rob Durkee of Putnam won the AAA crown with a time of 15:31.4. "Both ran well," said McMullen of Sandy's two entrants. He added that it was a "fun" trip.

Those who work the hardest and put in the weekend miles are the ones who make it to state, McMullen said. Romey has been known to run several miles to or from school, in addition to practice.

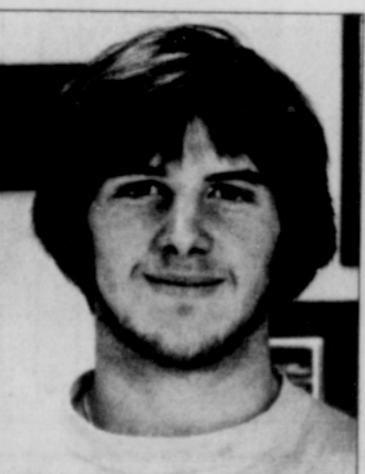
Reick had put in over 534 consecutive days of getting a run in before the state meet. He ran 2,200 miles in 1981, and expects to log 2,700 by the end of this year.

McMullen said he always has had "total trust" when it came to Romey and Reick. While there are other "novice" runners he had to prod, and watch to keep from cutting corners, he said he never worried about the team's top two runners.

"That's a good feeling," he said. McMullen said Reick was one of the hardest workers on the team at the end of the season. "He's got a taste for speed now, where before it was mainly distance." Reick told The Post he would like to break the school 3000-meter record next spring in track.

Sunset won the AAA boys title with 96 points. To be competitive with Sunset one would need "five Sam Romeys," McMullen said. He once made the same analogy about Wilson, the second-place team.

The Mt. Hood Conference boys were not well represented Saturday. Gresham was 16th, with 408 points, and Reynolds was 18th, out of 18 teams, with 448 points.

## Gymnasts win final season dual

The Pioneer gymnastics team ended the dual-meet season with a win over Reynolds, but had no one qualify for state competition at the district meet last week.

The Pioneers took a 110.8-108.15 squeaker from Reynolds. Senior Kim Parmenter was second in all-around competition, losing by five-hundredths of a point. Freshman Jodie Dahlager was third in all-around competition.

Parmenter took first in floor exercise, fourth in the vault, second on the uneven parallel bars, and second on the beam.

Dahlager was second in floor exercise, third on bars and fourth on the beam.

"We did great," said Coach Mol-

ly Knudsen, adding that Pioneer gymnasts turned in their best performances all year.

Depth was a key, with third and fourth people turning in "excellent routines."

Said Knudsen, "I was really pleased."

Dahlager had the best finish at the district meet last week, taking 12th (out of 41) on the beam.

Knudsen was also pleased with freshman Kelley Kai's 22nd-place finish in the vault.

Kim Parmenter was 15th (out of 23) in all-around competition. Dahlager was 18th and freshman Cindy Parmenter was 20th.

"Our bars once again proved fatal," Knudsen said.

Only the top nine in each event qualified for the district finals, with the top six finishers at the end of the competition going to state.

Parkrose had four of nine competing in each event going into the district finals, and handily won the title.

The Pioneers were eighth out of nine teams. Corbett, the ninth team, had an incomplete squad.

The Pioneers finished up with a 1-7 league record, 1-8 overall.

Girls on the team voted to honor their teammates recently. Dahlager was voted most valuable, Senior Sandy Sexton was voted the most inspirational and freshman Becky Farrand was voted the most improved.
