Studies text's history

Local church hosts Bible series

The Sandy Church of Christ is hosting a four-part series on the Bible beginning this Sunday, Nov. 21, with the 6:30 p.m. service. "We feel it's pertinent at this time," explained Pastor Dan Wheeler. "For the past couple hundred years, the Bible has been very much under attack. The archaeological and historical proofs very much establish the validity of the Bible." The series of filmstrips with soundtracks were

prepared by Neil Lightfoot, professor of religion at Abilene (Tex.) Christian University. "It's a refreshing study because it shows the Bible and its basic message has remained unchangeable through the centuries," Wheeler said. The first program, "The Bible Comes Into Being," examines making ancient books and speaks of the characteristics of the Bible itself.

The second program, "The Manuscripts of the Bible," takes a look at ancient Hebrew and Greek scriptures that are still in existence today. It will be shown Nov. 28. "The Versions of the Bible" describes the ancient versions of the Bible as well as its English versions. It will be shown Dec. 5. The final program, "The Bible and Recent Discoveries," looks at ar-

chaeological discoveries that have supported the Bible, such as the Isaiah Scrolls and the Dead Sea Scrolls. Wheeler will host each program. Following each 20-minute filmstrip, there will be a question-and-answer period, he said. Each service is expected to last one hour. All services will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the church located at 39640 Pioneer Blvd. The public is invited.

Fire marshal urges caution with chimney

Chilly evenings and mornings seem like ideal times to warm up the home with a fire in the fireplace, but before extensive use begins, the Sandy Fire Marshal advises some caution be taken. "As the weather begins to deteriorate, we're going to have a corresponding increase in chimney fires," said Jim Gallagher. Gallagher advises residents to check their chimney and, if warranted, schedule a mechanical cleaning. Dry, well-seasoned wood should be burned, he said. "Every day, religiously, burn the fire hot and open the drafts wide open. That burns out the creosote buildup on a daily basis." Gallagher suggests periodic checks of the chimney by tapping the stove. A "tinkling sound" could mean the beginning of creosote buildup and an increase in the chances for a chimney fire.
