Anna Foster

Sandy resident Anna R. Foster died Nov. 22 in Sandy at the age of 81.

Born Sept. 23, 1901 in Sweden, her family moved to the United States when she was 3. They lived in Minnesota and South Dakota until she was 12 when they moved to Canada where she completed her education.

She married Wilber "Bill" Foster in Saskatchewan, Canada, on Dec. 22, 1920. They moved to Washington in 1926. While raising their two daughters, Mrs. Foster also worked in nursing.

In 1943 the Fosters moved to Oregon, settling in Portland where she worked in the ship yards during World War II.

They moved to Sandy in 1952 where they helped originate and build the Sandy Assembly of God Church. She was active in all church activities.

She is survived by her husband; two daughters, Mable Myers of California and Evelyn Tharp of Junction City; two brothers, Louis Rolin of British Columbia and Edward Rolin of Arizona; four grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

Services were held Wednesday at the Sandy Assembly of God Church. Interment followed at the Firhill Memorial Cemetery in Sandy.

The family suggests memorials be made to Sandy Assembly of God Church in her memory.

She married Alan Lindholm on June 12, 1964 in Turner, Kan.

Two years later they moved to Oregon and settled in Sandy. Mrs. Lindholm was active in the Sandy VFW Auxiliary and enjoyed bowling.

She died Nov. 23 in Gresham at the age of 59.

She is survived by her husband, Alan; four children, Mary, Jim, Leslie and Dutch, and a brother, Leonard Cansler.

Lawrence Leest

Memorial services were held Wednesday at Kingdom Hall in Sandy for Lawrence N. Leest of Sandy, who died Nov. 22 at a Gresham hospital. He was 85.

He was born Jan. 23, 1897 in Holland. He moved to Iowa in 1914. Mr. Leest married Henrietta DeJong Oct. 10, 1916 in Oskaloosa, Iowa. They moved to Longview, Wash., in 1931 and then to the Sandy area in 1932 where they had resided since.

Mr. Leest was employed at various odd jobs through his life.

He was a minister of Jehovah's Witness since 1938, and was an elder of the Sandy congregation.

Survivors include his wife, Henrietta of Sandy; eight children, Nellie Wilder of Stayton, Evelyn Manning and Frances Pedersen, both of Portland, Arie Leest of Sandy, Donald Leest of California, Betty Meacham and Gerald Leest, both of Sweet Home, and Henry Leest of North Bend; 19 grandchildren, and 22 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Lindholm was born Ima Gene Cansler in Kansas City, Kan., on June 19, 1923. She was raised in Kansas.

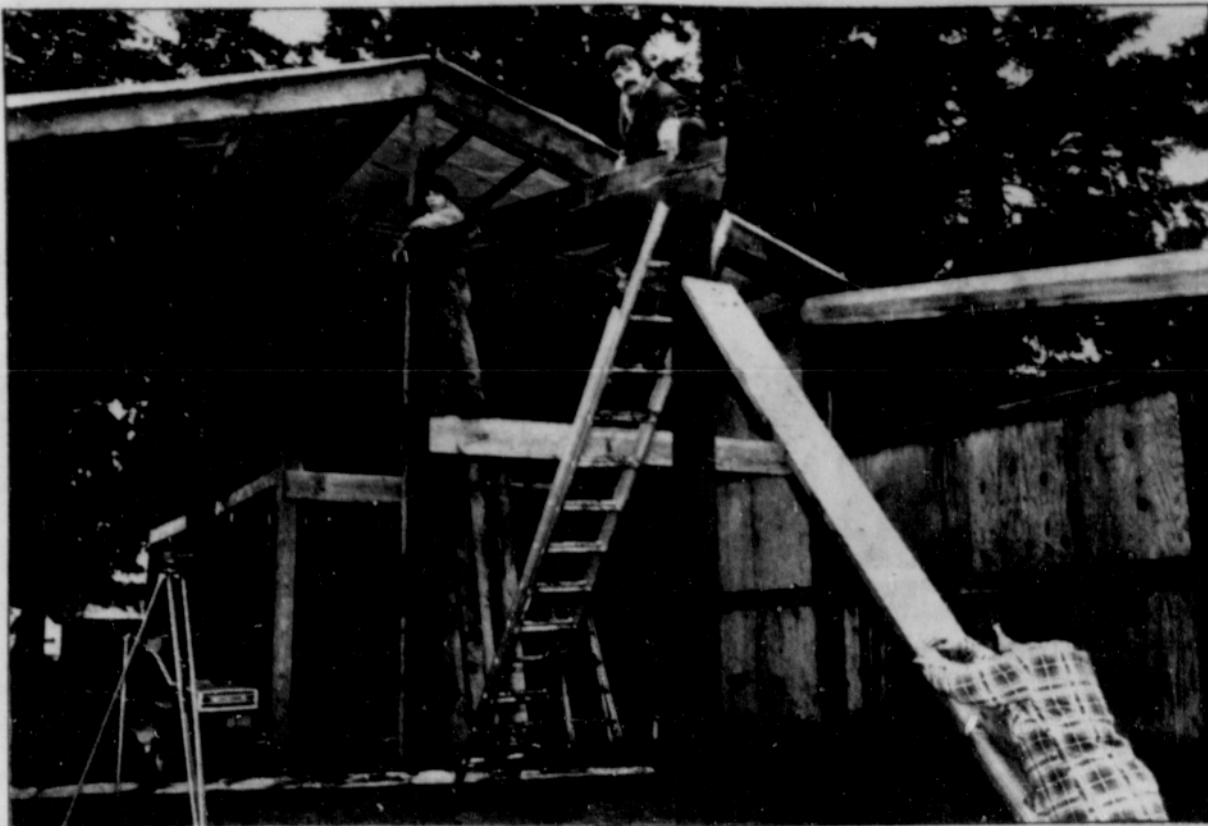
After completing her schooling, she worked for many years at the Armour Packing Plant. Later she owned and operated a restaurant in Kansas City.

Barn stands as class reminder

For the past month and a half while fellow students settled into their desks to begin another school day, 13 members of the agricultural mechanics class at Sandy High School have braved the rain and mud to build a barn.

The barn, at the Steve Gesdahl farm on 362nd Avenue, is the seventh that teacher Les Geren has overseen in his 10 years at the school.

"It's a super learning experience," he said. "That's what I think; that's why I do it."

Building the 24-by-48-foot structure gives the students an opportunity to employ some of the practices they study in the general farm shop class, which also includes wiring, arc welding and small implement maintenance.

"Each kid draws up his own plan and his own bill of materials," Geren explained, before they begin construction.

Gesdahl bought all the materials for \$2,300 and "the kids get experience only," he said. "There isn't one of them who has built a barn before."

Geren said a commercial outfit could probably build the same structure in two working days with a crew of three or four, but they would have access to more sophisticated machinery for the construction such as cranes for placing trusses.

"We do all our work from ladders," the teacher pointed out. "There are limitations to what you can do 22 feet up in the air on a ladder."

The students also noted the slow progress as first-time barn builders.

"It took us two weeks to get all the poles in," Geren said. "All you have is 15 sticks sticking in the air. The kids were really depressed."

"Then in two days you put up the walls and the kids say, 'Wow, this is all right.'"

The students surveyed the site, leveled the poles—"We pulled more than one pole out and had to redig the hole because they weren't level," Geren noted—and did all the construction.

Geren acted as foreman and quality control inspector. The hardest part of his job was "being 11 places at one time. That's why my biggest job is quality control."

SUHS representatives visit feeder schools
