PUBLIC NOTICE OF FILING OF GENERAL TELEPHONE RATE INCREASE APPLICATION

On December 1, 1982, General Telephone Company of the Northwest, Inc., filed with the Public Utility Commissioner of Oregon revised rate schedules to establish increased rates to its Oregon customers.

If approved as submitted, the \$18.6 million requested would represent an increase of about 16 percent in total Oregon intrastate revenue.

Basic one-party residential rates for General Telephone's customers would increase in the range of \$3.62 to \$6.55 per month, depending on the exchange involved, local calling availability and type of service provided.

Why Are We Proposing An Increase?

The company's request for a rate increase must be viewed as part of the continuing transformation taking place within the telecommunications industry. The Federal Communications Commission and various court decisions have introduced competition into those segments of the business that previously provided a subsidy to local exchange service. As this subsidy begins to disappear in the face of competition, local service rates must more truly reflect their actual costs.

Included in the company's request for increased rates is an offset of the impact of FCC decisions affecting changes in depreciation expenses and the toll settlements process.

Consumers will benefit from deregulation changes through the availability of new services and the ability to choose telephone equipment from a variety of sources.

The impact on the company of the prolonged economic slowdown also plays a role in our request for higher rates. Despite efforts to control costs, the company has been unable to earn an adequate rate of return. Lower than expected local and toll revenue, combined with higher operating expenses

and higher depreciation rates, are resulting in an erosion of earnings despite efforts to hold down costs. Revenue under the present tariff is not sufficient to cover increased costs.

The company plans on conducting informational meetings at various locations to explain the changes taking place in the telecommunications industry as well as the rate application and to receive public input. Notices of the meeting times and location will be published in local newspapers.

While the purpose of this notice is to provide you with general information as to General Telephone's proposed rate increase, you should be aware that the proposal, calculations and statements contained in this notice are not binding on the Public Utility Commissioner of Oregon, and he may issue an order affecting rates different from those proposed by the company.
