

MacDonald named to board

Longtime Sandy Union High School booster Dan MacDonald was appointed Monday to the school's board of education.

The Portland advertising executive fills a vacancy created when Ralph Griffin Jr. resigned from the board in December for health reasons.

The school board cited MacDonald for his years of service to the district as a member of the budget and curriculum committees.

In accepting the appointment, MacDonald said, "With a little hard work we will prevail and will keep turning out the very best students."

His appointment created a vacancy on the district budget committee. The board filled that

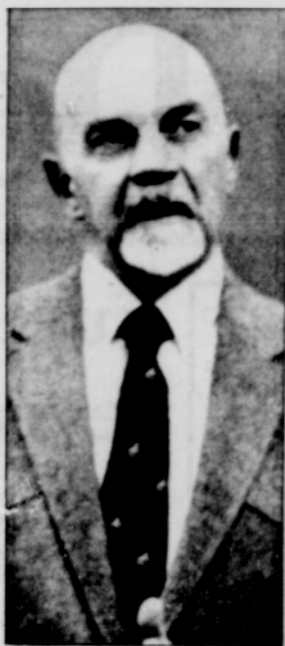
position with the appointment of Jeanne Doty, formerly principal at Gresham's Gordon Russell Middle School.

She and fellow budget committee members will convene Monday night, Jan. 17, at 7:30 p.m. in Rooms 50-51 at the school to begin budget deliberations.

Superintendent Jack Peters outlined plans for re-establishing administrative offices on the campus to replace those destroyed by fire.

He said insurance coverage will not pay all replacement costs. City of Sandy officials have indicated the building will have to be moved 20 feet from the school, if it is replaced near its former site. That could create extra costs for fill and engineering.

An alternative would be to locate the offices

across Bluff Road on district-owned property.

Peters said. That site was prepared in 1976 expressly for the purpose of constructing an administration building.

Earlier in the meeting the school board firmed up requirements for SUHS seniors who want to walk with classmates at commencement activities. Under the new plan only students who are within one credit of graduation, and have filed an acceptable plan to complete that credit, will automatically walk with fellow seniors.

Students within three credits may apply for a hardship exception, and will be required to establish an independent study plan, attend Mt. Hood Community College courses, enter the extended day program at SUHS or take a correspondence course to qualify to walk.

Park site said flood-prone

A trade-off between a developer and the city of Sandy will result in a new park when Knollwood Estates is complete.

Neighbors of the project, however, think the city may have gotten the short end of the stick.

The city last week OK'd a request by developer Les Brown to develop six additional lots on the south side of Dubarko Road, near Sandy Heights Road, in exchange for open space near Tickle Creek.

Neighbors contend that the open space is nothing more than a marsh.

"The land (Brown) wants to give for the park is full of springs," according to Jim Lauer who owns property just south of the site. The area where the six additional homes will be built in the planned unit development also faces high water

from flooding of Tickle Creek, he said.

"I'm afraid those six lots could turn into Sandy's Johnson Creek area," Lauer said, referring to the Southeast Portland area plagued by annual flooding.

The location of the six lots in relation to the 100-year flood plain of the creek has been a city consideration. However, engineering studies show that a larger culvert under Sandy Heights Road could alleviate high water concerns.

"I don't think we, as a council, have a right to engineer or design a project," said City Councilor Jim Duff. "If it meets the criteria for buildable land, we have to accept that."

Brown defended his request to develop the additional lots, noting that the area had been "scalped"

by a previous owner in a logging operation. "I'm going to give a site that's still original," he said. The marshiness of the park site shouldn't be a concern, Brown added. He envisions it primarily for summer use and another site, near Sandy Heights Road, to take the heaviest recreational use.

Retreat focuses on women

A weekend to explore patterns of reaction to change and develop constructive ways to push through to a new life energy awaits area women at the Alton Collins Retreat Center at the end of this month.

Natalie Rogers, author of "Emerging Woman: A Decade of Midlife Transitions," will lead the weekend-long retreat, Jan. 28-30. She has led women's groups in Chile, Argentina, Mexico and Europe as well as across the United States.

In California she initiated, with her father Carl, residential workshops in the Person Centered Approach. She maintained a private practice as a psychotherapist in Boston and San Francisco. The workshop is one of many offered at the year-old retreat center. Nancy Trotter said the center, owned and operated by the United Methodist Church, is working hard to offer a variety of broad educational experiences for adults.

Along with the retreats, the center hosted a series of Summerfest concerts last year and this week is home for the Sandy Community Players' cabaret performances.

The weekend-long retreat with Rogers kicks off Jan. 28 with a lecture, open to men and women, that will lay the foundation for the weekend studies.

Using slides from her photo album and her art journal, Rogers will begin with her own personal statement of girl-child expectations and how it affected her marriage and singlehood.

Small group discussion will follow.

The Alton Collins Retreat Center is located four miles west of Sandy, off Highway 211, in a wooded area and features all the advantages of its country setting combined with the comfort and convenience of a modern facility.
