Districts study busing co-op

Combining transportation services of Sandy Union High School and its five feeder districts will save each district money, officials believe.

However, before they rush to merge services they are studying other possible benefits and potential pitfalls.

"All that's left is exploring what options we have and how much we're going to save," according to Borling Elementary School superintendent Joe Taylor.

"The thing we need to remember is we're not reinventing the wheel," said SUHS board chairman Wayne Johnson. "All this has been done before."

Last Wednesday the superintendent of the Silverton Union High School District, which has successfully made the transition, told a study committee that while consolidation of services under a private contract may not be a panacea, it won't compound problems either.

"We're happy with contract busing," John Thompson said. "It doesn't reduce your problems. It doesn't reduce your headaches, but there are no more headaches."

The Silverton district began providing bus ser-

vice for its nine feeder districts in 1966. Two years ago, the district contracted with Dorsey Bus of Corvallis to provide the service. Since that time, the school districts involved have saved approximately \$100,000 collectively, Thompson said.

The primary cost reduction is payroll, he said. The private contractor absorbed school district employees, most of whom remained with Dorsey. Unfair labor practice filings followed as has been the case wherever school districts have gone to con-

tract services.

The district also leased its fleet to Dorsey for the three-year contract, with two-year option, rather than sell it. Dorsey has brought in new buses when old buses became obsolete in the leased fleet.

"In five years, we're going to be in a little bit of trouble," Thompson said in case his district opts to discontinue the contract. "Ten years, we'll be in the same shape as if we'd sold the fleet."
