

Fire board has three vacancies

Three positions on the Sandy Fire District board of directors will be on the ballot when voters go to the polls March 29.

Sandy Fire Chief Bob Rathke said interested candidates may pick up nominating petitions for the four-year posts at the local fire station or at the County Elections Office. To get his or her name on the ballot, a candidate will be required to collect 25 signatures of registered voters in the district or pay \$10.

Deadline for filing at the County Elections Office is Feb. 23 at 5 p.m.

Board members are responsible for the complete operation of the fire district, Rathke said, and should have an interest in fire and emergency first aid service in the Sandy area.

Board members whose terms are expiring are Tom Day, Jim Duff and Rick Carey.

Funeral service for Sandy resident and business man Archie Woodard were held Wednesday in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home.

He died suddenly at his home Jan. 15. He was 43.

Mr. Woodard owned and operated Archie's Waterbeds on Proctor Boulevard in Sandy and a second store in Portland, Archie's Waterbed Liquidators.

He was born William Archie Woodard on May 9, 1939 in Bryson City, N.C. His family moved to Washington before moving to Sandy. Mr. Woodard graduated from Sandy High School in 1957.

After graduation he enlisted in the Army reserves and worked in the timber industry. He then moved to California where he attended Shasta Junior College and California Baptist College. He lived in Sacramento for nearly 18 years where he was self-employed in the furniture, mattress and waterbed industry.

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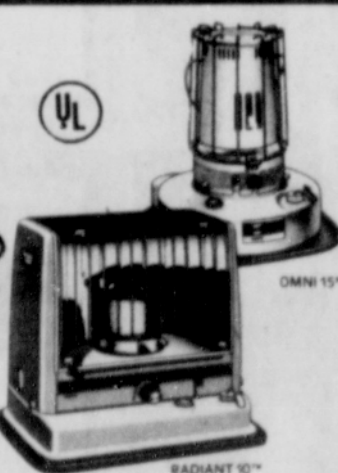
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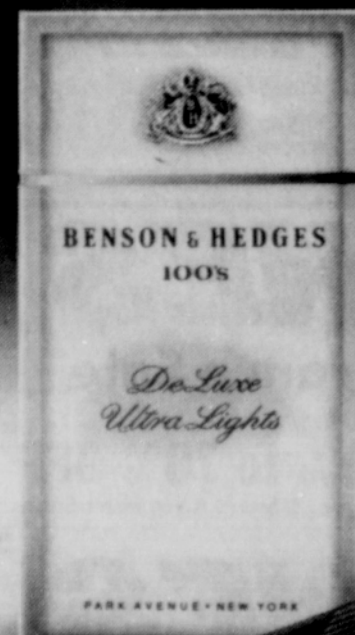
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
