Postmaster sets eye on traveling

Stamps were just 4 cents apiece and post cards were a penny when Naomi Blaisdell went to work as a postmaster in the Hoodland area.

In those days, it was a short walk to work. The post office was in her Wemme home.

When Mrs. Blaisdell leaves the Welches Post Office this Friday for the last time as postmaster, she'll take 30 years of memories with her and a knack for knowing who got what, even when it was improperly addressed.

When she went to work, "no one even thought about addresses," she said Tuesday over the counter of the shining new facility that has replaced two home editions she's managed in her tenure.

"I've spoon-fed these

people for 30 years and now I keep telling them, they're going to have to use their addresses. I know where it goes, so it gets there."

The Mt. Hood area shifted to the five-digit addresses that originate in downtown Portland three years ago, but many residents seem to remember the times when just a hundred clients were on the mountain postal facility's mailing list.

"I can't even remember how many customers I had when we first started," Mrs. Blaisdell confessed.

Whatever the early total, it has grown to 486 boxholders with another 160 on the star routes that traverse the countryside, served by contract carrier.

Mrs. Blaisdell said that the other night she stopped to think how impor-

tant years in her life end in "3." She was born in 1923, married in 1943, went to work in 1953 and is retiring in 1983.

What 1993 holds in store, she isn't sure, but chances are she will be on the road somewhere.

Following her retir-

ment, she plans a move to Vancouver, Wash., and settling into a condominium there near her mother, sister and brother.

Then she plans to travel and visit her children and grandchildren. Next fall will find her in Germany, visiting her youngest son who is a civilian employee with the military there.

"When I went to work, I never thought I'd be here like this," she said. "You don't take a job and think I'll be here 30 years."

When she retires Friday, she will have outlasted her expectations, perhaps, but not her welcome in the area she's served, smiling and remembering who lives where.

Jack Burke of the Estacada office will fill in as temporary postmaster.

Board seeks paving answer

Welches School District is asking legal counsel for advice on whether to proceed against the contractor who poured asphalt at the new addition of Welches Grade School.

Board member Don Thornberg said that he has been in touch with Jim Turin and Sons, the asphalt contractors for the bus

garage and the roadway. "It seems that at the time they were putting down this asphalt, they had quite a number of batches on quite a number of jobs where the asphalt did not turn out the way it should," said Thornberg.

In the Welches School case, Thornberg said, the asphalt is "raveling," and small rocks are "peeling out of the top of the asphalt."

"What that is, it lets the water down through and pretty soon all your asphalt's gone," said Thornberg.

Turin and Son's said the one-year warranty period for the job is up, but Thornberg said the company "was willing to put down a sealer on the bus garage and the section of the road between the old asphalt that we had in at the upper grade building down to where the parking lot begins (at the new addition)."

From this point, Thornberg said the asphalt "is in good shape and it's not raveling yet."

"They'll put that down at no charge, other than the materials, if we will buy

the materials," said Thornberg.

The cost of the sealer is approximately \$1,500.

"I think it's money well spent to preserve the asphalt for a number of years, where we might lose it in just a few years if we don't do something," said Thornberg.

The cost of sealing the entire area as a preventive measure would be nearly double.

Thornberg said the company first learned that they had purchased bad asphalt about six months ago when other jobs began to ravel.

In those other paving jobs, Thornberg said, the company made the same offer they've made the district.

Lunch prices get boost at Cottrell

School lunch prices will increase 5 cents for all Cottrell School students starting this Monday, Jan. 31.

The decision to increase the price was made by the Cottrell School board at the Jan. 17 meeting after studying revenue earned and the total costs of the lunch program at mid-year, as presented by the Citizens' Lunch Advisory Committee.

Students in kindergarten through the fourth grade will now pay 65 cents a day or \$3.25 a week. Students in grades five through eight will pay 80 cents daily or \$4 weekly.

There will be no increase in the price of adult lunches or milk.

Hydro project plans face review

Three preliminary permit applications to generate hydroelectric power on tributaries of the Clackamas River will be considered by the Water Policy Review Board this Monday, Jan. 31.

The three proposals, filed by Pioneer Hydro Power Inc. of Sandy, will be studied in council

chambers at Estacada City Hall. They involve hydroelectric projects proposed on the North Fork of the Clackamas River, Whale Creek and Fall Creek.

The North Fork project would use 85.8 cubic feet per second of water from the river. The company proposes to develop as

much as 3,656 theoretical horsepower through the construction of a diversion structure.

At the Fall Creek hydroelectric plant, 30.8 cubic feet per second of water will be tapped to generate up to 2,110 theoretical horsepower.

The smallest plant at Whale Creek would develop

up to 1,784 theoretical horsepower by using 6.9 cubic feet per second of water.

The hearings are to determine whether the proposed project will impair or be detrimental to the public interest.

If the permit is issued, Pioneer Hydro Power will make further studies.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF FILING OF OREGON ELECTRIC RATE INCREASE APPLICATION

On January 10, 1983, Portland General Electric Company filed revised rate schedules with the Public Utility Commissioner of Oregon to establish increased electric service rates.

If the application is approved, as filed, the residential rate request is for a 3.6% interim increase, while the PUC studies the need for an additional residential increase of 0.9%. Rates for commercial and industrial customers would increase 5.2% on an interim basis, with an additional 4.4% to be reviewed by the PUC. If the Commissioner approves the application, the Company's revenues would increase approximately 8.35% or \$47.5 million.

For residential customers using 1,000 kilowatt-hours a month, the interim request would increase the monthly bill by \$1.34. An additional 64¢ per month will be added to the bill if the full request is granted.
