

Ham casserole gives leftovers just desserts

HAM-POTATO CASSEROLE

Grease casserole dish. Put in one layer of sliced raw potatoes, one layer sliced onions, one layer of diced or cut ham. Mix two cans of mushroom soup with one can of milk. Pour one-third of this soup mixture over layer. Repeat with two more layers. Dot with butter, sprinkle with paprika. Cover with lid and bake at 300 degrees for 45 minutes to one hour, remove lid and brown for 15 minutes. — From the files of Paula Routt-Duckworth, Portland.

After a big dinner the above recipe offers a great way to make a fresh dinner from left-over ham.

If you are looking for a deliciously different dish to

serve, try this one. It is a prize-winning recipe Aggie Barker gave me several years ago. We'll never forget Aggie as one of Sandy's good cooks and cheerful good citizens (the sunbeam type).

SWEET ONION BAKE

7½ cups chopped sweet onions
4 Tablespoons butter
½ cup raw rice
5 cups boiling salted water
¾ cup grated Swiss cheese (or choice)

2/3 cup half and half cream
Saute onions and butter, cook rice in water for five minutes. Drain and mix with onions, add cheese and cream. Bake covered at 300 degrees for one hour. Serves 8. Parmesan cheese is an optional topping. — From the files of the late Aggie Barker, Sandy.

DELICIOUS SAUERKRAUT

½ lb. bacon
2 onions
1 large can sauerkraut
1 large can tomatoes
1 cup sugar

Cut up bacon and cook with two onions. Stir into the sauerkraut, tomatoes and sugar. Put in casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. This is also served cold as a relish. Serves 6-8. — From the files of Thelma Elkinton, The Dalles.

GREEN BEANS WITH SLIVERED ALMONDS

1 (8 oz.) can sliced mushrooms
3 Tablespoons butter
2 can French cut green

beans

1½ cups slivered almonds
Saute drained mushrooms in butter in large skillet or pan. Add drained green beans and almonds and cook until thoroughly heated. Serves eight. — From the files of Gary Berger, Beaverton.

GREEN TOPPED SALAD

1 (3 oz.) pkg. orange gelatin
2 (3 oz.) pkgs. Philadelphia cream cheese
1 small can crushed pineapple
½ lb. or 3 cups miniature marshmallows

½ cup Miracle Whip Salad Dressing

1 cup whipping cream or (1 pkg. Dream Whip)
1 pkg. (3 oz.) lime gelatin or 1 (8 oz.) pkg.

Prepare orange gelatin with 2 cups hot water and pour hot over marshmallows in a large bowl and whip until marshmallows melt. Mix cheese, pineapple and Miracle Whip into marshmallows. Cools. Fold in whipped cream. Place in refrigerator to set. (Overnight is O.K.)

Prepare package of lime gelatin with 2 cups water. When it begins to thicken, pour over the set mixture. Serves 8-10. — From the files of Eula Ten Eyck,

PUMPKIN PIE CAKE

Beat 4 eggs in a large bowl. Add 1 large can evaporated milk, 1 large can pumpkin (#2f4), 1 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons cinnamon. Mix and pour into a 9"x13" greased pan. Sprinkle 1 pkg. yellow cake mix (or white cake mix) over top. Drizzle with ½ cup melted butter or margarine. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Serve with Cool Whip or whipped cream, or ice cream. Here's a good appetizer: SALMON BALL
1 small can or 1 cup

salmon, skinned, deboned and drained

1 Tablespoon liquid smoke
2 teaspoons cream style horseradish
8 oz. pkg. (soft) cream cheese

½ teaspoon minced green onion
Dash of lemon juice

Mix together. Form into ball and chill. Serve with wheat thins or Ritz crackers. Very good! — From the files of Sara Berger, Sandy.

HAMBURGER-BROCCOLI CASSEROLE

1 lb. hamburger, uncooked
Pre-cooked broccoli, (1 pkg.), cook broccoli spears

just until crispy, drain. Small pkg. tater tots (keep out a few to put on top). 1-1½ cups cheese cut in chunks
1 can diluted mushroom soup

Mix together and put into a 9"x9" pan, and top with reserved tater tots. Bake one hour at 350 degrees. Serves 6-8. — From the files of Helen Schafer, Eugene.

Zig Zag Inn benefit aids senior citizens

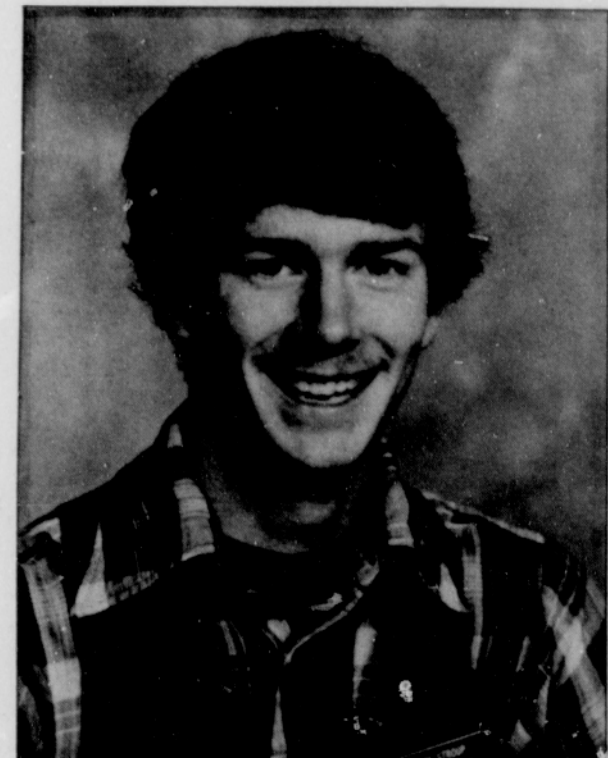
The Zig Zag Inn will host a special benefit this Friday evening.

Swails is the son of Jerry and Helen Swails of Sandy. He graduated from SUHS in 1977 and attended Mt. Hood Community College and Oregon State University.

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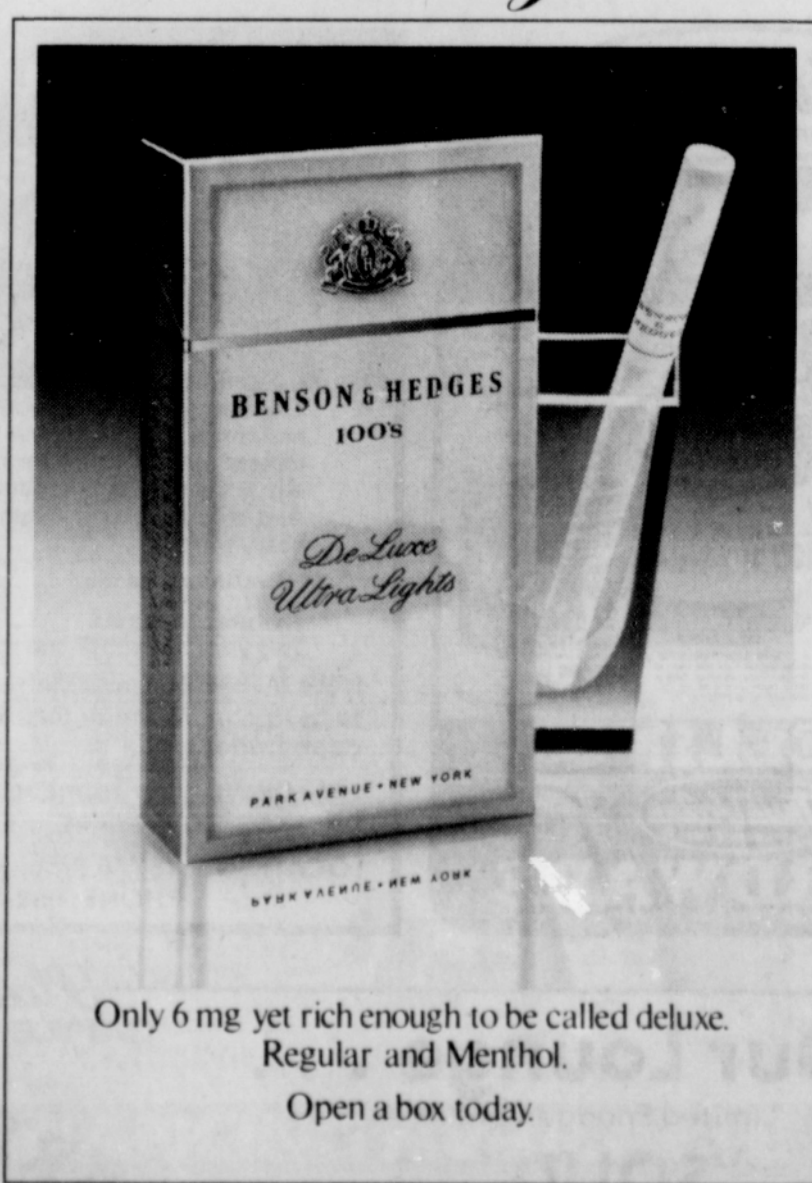
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
