

'Barn raising' helps build home

A couple who dream of a unique, large log home high atop Twilight Lane near Moonbeam Drive southwest of Sandy say they're getting lots of free help from curious folks who drop by.

"We have 18-foot beams that must weigh 800 pounds, and three extra people who drop in and help make a big difference," said Mikeleen Reed-Tolonen, an instructor at Mt. Hood College.

Still, the logs for their 2,600-square-foot home (excluding basement) run lighter and less costly than normal green logs to follow the same house plan.

The logs are lighter because they're dry, and they're cheaper because they were killed by beetles.

Consequently, there's no shrinkage as with wet logs, and the cost for their dream home on the hill will run about half the cost of conventional logs.

Mikeleen and husband Bruce Tolonen, an in-

structor at Centennial High School, hope soon to move from their Gresham condominium.

They're doing their own plumbing, electrical in-

stallation and steep shake roofing.

Bruce Tolonen cut the windows and doors with a chainsaw.

Most supplies were pur-

chase locally.

But those cheap, dry beetle-killed logs?

Well, first they rented a truck and traveled to the mill in Montana.

When that got to be a hassle, they started finding independent truckers who would haul logs back from Montana at backhaul rates.

Thieves hit lockers at Sandy High

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Pet licensers in Sandy next week

Clackamas County officials are saying, "Love 'em. License 'em," as the deadline for pet licenses approaches.

Because of cuts in the county budget, a representative of Clackamas County Animal Control will not be stationed at Sandy City

Hall as in the past to help local residents meet the March 1 cutoff date.

However, Sandy Animal Clinic, 39231 Proctor Blvd., is holding a rabies clinic this Tuesday, Feb. 8, and a representative from Animal Control will be at the clinic from 5 to 7 p.m. to

sell licenses.

To license your pet, you need a copy of current rabies certificate valid through Oct. 31; proof of spay-neuter, if applicable; proof of age, if you are age 65 or older, and a check in the correct amount.

If your pet was licensed

in Clackamas County last year, Animal Control officials will have the license listed in the coputer.

License fees are \$12 for a fertile male or female and \$6 for a neutered or spayed animal. One \$3 senior citizen discount per household is also available

where applicable.

Licenses will be sold at the Clackamas County Animal Shelter, 2104 S Kaen Road, Oregon City. The nearest sites to Sandy with licenses are Timberland Animal Clinic in Estacada or 212 Animal Clinic in Damascus.

Arson tip nets resident \$1500 award

A Sandy resident was presented \$1,500 by Gov. Vic Atiyeh Friday in a ceremony at the Capitol honoring citizens who helped solve arson crimes in Oregon during 1982.

The award was one of the first to come from a \$5,000 fund sponsored by Oregon insurance companies and maintained by the Oregon Arson Award Committee. This is the first year

awards have been presented.

The award recipient, who remained anonymous, assisted Oregon State Police by providing information vital to solving an arson fire which destroyed a single-family residence near Alder Creek Jan. 28, 1982, causing a \$90,000 loss. An individual arrested in that case was later convicted of first-degree ar-

son.

David Yonan was found guilty by a Clackamas County Circuit Court jury Aug. 16, 1982 of hiring someone to burn his house at 20435 Hummingbird Lane so he could collect on insurance, according to Judy Johnson, of the district attorney's office.

The Oregon Arson Award Committee is comprised of

representatives from the insurance industry, fire service, law enforcement and a number of state agencies concerned with reducing arson fires in the state through increased public awareness and involvement.

The award program began last month. The hotline, 1-800-452-7888, may be used from anywhere in

Oregon by someone who has information to report on a fire they suspect may be arson. Calls on the hotline ring into Oregon State Police headquarters where they are relayed to appropriate authorities.

Rep. Smith sets Sandy get-together

Congressman Denny Smith, R-Ore., will hold a town meeting next week in Sandy.

The 5th Congressional District representative will meet with constituents Feb. 11 at 1:30 p.m. at the Sandy Community Center, 38348 Pioneer Blvd.

The meeting is expected to focus on proposals to strengthen Social Security and efforts to control deficit spending.

"Seldom before has a peace-time Congress faced more difficult decisions than those confronting this session. Your opinions are invaluable to me as I represent Willamette Valley residents in the Congress," Smith said, announcing the town meeting.

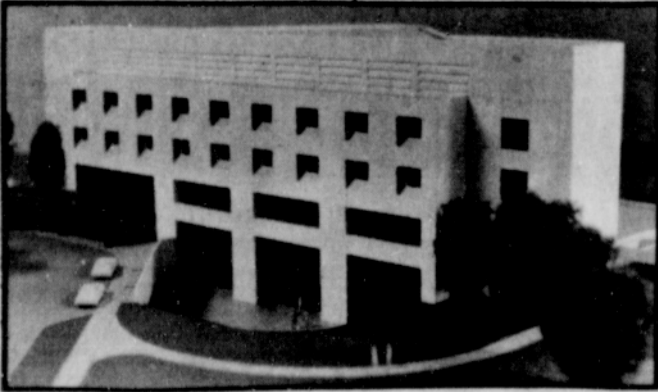

You Need Us

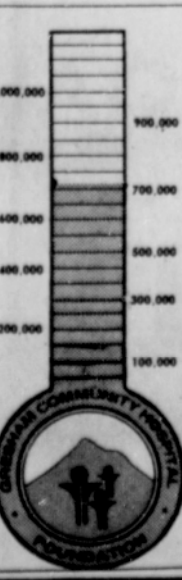
