Retired Cherryville
postmaster succumbs

Former Cherryville postmaster Catherine Amundsen died Feb. 6 in Sandy. She was 81 years old.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, Feb. 9, in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. Private interment followed at River-view Cemetery in Portland.

Born Catherine Thayer on Jan. 14, 1902 at Laurelwood, near Gaston, she was raised and educated in that area.

Her family moved to Cherryville in 1925 to make their home. She worked with her father operating the Cherryville store and assisted him in the post office where he was postmaster. During this time, she was also an avid horse back rider.

She married Sylvester Amundsen in 1947. He preceded her in death in 1967.

When her father retired as postmaster, she was appointed to the position. She remained postmaster until the post office closed in 1958.

Mrs. Amundsen is survived by two nephews, Harry C. Thayer of Eugene and Martin Allen of Sandy.

The family suggests memorials be made to the Sandy Community Presbyterian Church Ladies Aid in her memory.

Services for John W. Penuel Jr. were held Tuesday in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. Private interment followed at the Cliffside Cemetery in Sandy.

Mr. Penuel died Feb. 3 in Redmond. He was 37 years old.

Born Sept. 15, 1945 to John and Emma Penuel in Portland, he graduated from Centennial High School and began working in the automotive parts business.

Parenting class scheduled

The Clackamas County Public Health Division kicks off a new series of Parent Education Classes locally today.

The free classes will be offered monthly at Sandy Immanuel Lutheran Church along with a monthly Women, Infants and Children clinic. Classes begin at 2 p.m. and last approximately 45 minutes.

"The County Health Department has had some budget cuts last year," explained Frances Spak, who coordinates the classes and clinics. "We've had to reduce some home visits, so we thought those families in the county who used to have home visits could come to one of our classes."

Today's class will cover "Child Rearing Principles; Coping with Your Tensions."

In coming months, classes will cover "Child Development: Birth to 18 Months," "Child Development: 1 to 5 Years," "Discipline and Time-out Techniques," "Child Abuse-Neglect," "Toilet Training," "Communication, Speech and Hearing," "Meatimes and Behavior in Public," "Sibling Rivalry and Jealousy," "Bedtime and Dressing Skills" and "Medicines."

Health Education classes will also be held in conjunction with WIC clinics monthly at the church. They begin at 10 a.m. and last about 30 minutes.

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Department heads seek
teachers to boost staffs

Department heads at Sandy Union High School are feeling the pinch of past budget cuts and defeated B ballots.

With budgeting not underway, they are trying to make up for past setbacks and bring their departments up to an even keel.

Last Thursday evening, department chairmen for mathematics and social studies told the district budget committee that their departments could each use an additional teacher, although neither budgeted for one.

"We have five full-time instructors and seven part-time instructors and you co just about flip a coin to find the departments they're coming from," Zel Gernhardt, math chairman, told the committee.

The math department serves 865 students.

Cliff O'Harrow told the committee that he came with a message from his social studies teachers.

"We could do without (department reference books) if we could have another teacher," he said.

"The fellows in the department said, 'Scrub the whole budget if we could have another teacher.'"

The department has seven teachers instructing 1,034 students.

Superintendent Jack Peters said two additional teachers would cost the district approximately \$50,000.

Gernhardt also defended his request for a 400 percent jump in purchased services for the math department, citing that he is the fourth department head in that area in four years and he is trying to bring it up to standards.

Principal John McMahan backed Gernhardt's request. "It's the area where our test scores were lowest and where we need the most help," he said.

At an earlier budget committee meeting, Leslie Pease, head of participating and performing arts currently on leave, told the board that some items she requested had been on the "wish list" a number of times but had been cut off during the budgeting process.

"In a lot of these areas, these requests have been here three and four years," she said. Approximately 930 students are served by the department, she said.

Home economics teacher Pat Wolf asked for replacement of 10-year-old stoves that have been used seven periods a day, 20 students a period.

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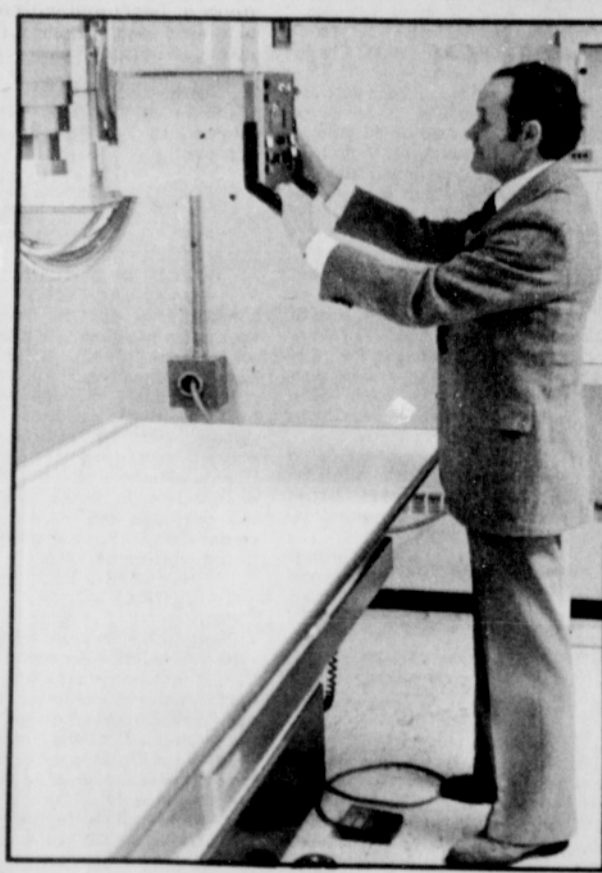

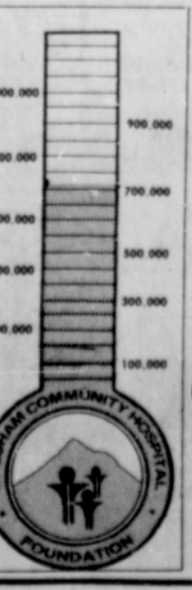
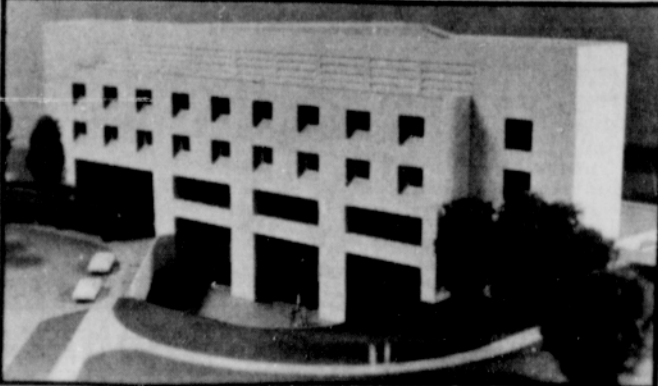
