Students enjoying exchange

The six foreign exchange students studying at Sandy High School have several things in common.

They are all from cities, and they are all enjoying their time at the high school and in Oregon.

"Here I see the people live good," said German Velez of Bogota, Columbia. "Not a lot of money, but the people live good."

The exchange students are most concerned about the misconceptions people have about their respective countries.

Victor Martinez of Bilbao, Spain, gets tired of people asking what part of Mexico he's from, though all the students claim they like to be asked about their native countries.

Afua Danso-Manu of Accra, Ghana, said most people think of jungles and wild animals when they think of Africa.

Pernilla Fack of Helsingborg, Sweden, pointed out that not all Swedes are blond, or good skiers. However, she didn't help dissolve this stereotype by finishing 10th for the Pioneers in a Mt. Hood Conference ski race Saturday.

Fack said "school spirit" is a major difference between Sandy High and her school in Sweden.

Involvement is another

common thread among the foreign students. Martinez, Velez and Javier Herrero of Madrid, Spain, are currently on the swim team. Velez ran cross country while Martinez and Herrero played soccer.

Miwa Sakai of Osaka, Japan, plays on the junior varsity basketball team, and Danso-Manu is a major contributor to the Mountain Echoes student newspaper.

"I love the sports here," said Herrero, who swam the last leg of the winning 400 freestyle relay against Centennial to help clinch a win for the Sandy boys. "I like the opportunities."

Martinez joked about the last soccer game of the season where he was ejected from the game. Herrero was yellow carded (received a warning). "It was not fair," he said, explaining that the referees were too strict.

"When you play soccer in Spain you can hardly walk (when you are done)," he said.

He liked Lon Welsh as a coach, and said the players here are more aggressive, but don't control the ball as well as players in Spain.

He's not sure about the concept of working through pain, especially as applied to swimming. "If you die, there will be someone to replace you," he joked, playing the part of a hard-line coach.

All in all, he's found the students at Sandy congenial. "If you're in a bad mood, they'll try to cheer you up," he said.

"When you have a hard time with a word, they'll help you. That makes you feel good."

Classes are set up differently where Martinez went to school, with the teachers and not the students changing classrooms. "If you skip school in Spain, you go all

day long. Here, they skip just one period.

"Put it in (the article)," he added. "They need to learn."

Sakai has perhaps been the one who's been made to feel the most at home. She's staying with Dr. Boyd and Lillias Crane, and Boyd speaks Japanese "very well."

In addition Dr. Crane can prepare Japanese food, so she occasionally gets a home-style meal

without having to do the cooking.

Osaka is the second largest city in Japan, with a population of about 5 million people. "House, house, house, house. People, people, people, people," is how Sakai described it.

The difference between the two countries, she said, "Americans very friendly. Japanese very shy."

According to Fack, all

the exchange students are good friends. At one point they laughed about a photograph of Velez going off a small jump on snow skis. There is a wild expression on his face. "I didn't know the snow before I came here," he said. Oregon is "very nice."

Velez said there is "not a lot of difference" between the young people of the world.

OBERAMMERGAU PASSION PLAY

1984 brings an extraordinary opportunity to attend what, for 350 years, has been a once-in-a-decade event: the Passion Play in Oberammergau. The village is breaking with tradition to celebrate the play's 350th anniversary with a full season — only four years after the immensely successful performance of 1980.

In 1633, the little Alpine village of Oberammergau was threatened by the Black Death that scourged Europe. The people of the valley prayed to be spared, vowing that they would present the story of the Passion of Christ every ten years thereafter.

Thus began one of the world's most inspiring events. The show is spectacular. Costumes are hand-made, the beards and long hair are authentic. The score, written in 1814, is sung and played by a chorus and orchestra of 100, and the cast calls for 600 players.

Oberammergau is a humble Alpine village of cuckoo-clock houses wrapped year-round in the atmosphere of the Passion Play. It has a pervasive peacefulness untouched by the once-every-10-years intrusion of 20th century hubbub.

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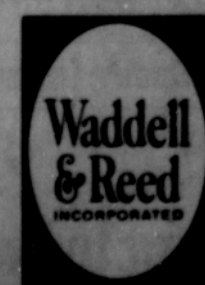
