SUHS to move administration offices

The new Sandy Union High School administration building will be built in a new location.

SUHS board members voted Monday to construct the new offices across Bluff Road, adjacent to student parking. The site has been targeted by long-range planning as a logical location for the building.

Superintendent Jack Peters told the board that city of Sandy officials had encouraged the school district to rebuild on the new site and that costs of rebuilding adjacent to the Tucker Building would be prohibitive. "Everything leads to across the street, as far as economics," he said.

Insurance payments for the administration's

former home in the double-wide trailer destroyed by fire Dec. 22 have totaled \$38,255 for the shell. Peters said he expects payment for the building's contents soon.

Had the old site been chosen, city officials would have required it be placed a greater distance from the Tucker Building, which was also slightly damaged in the Dec. 22 fire, creating

additional costs for fill and setback.

The board plans a special meeting to discuss construction of the new offices, but stopped short of appointing a clerk of the works at this time.

In other action, the Sandy High School board: —Allocated \$8,400 to reroof the Frasier Building. The work will be

done by Frazier Roofing of Gresham.

—Allocated \$642.90 to participate in a route study for the Transportation Study Committee, pending a legal opinion. That amount would be higher because Welches School District officials have decided not to participate in the study with SUHS and its feeder school districts.

Proceeds for this year's carnival will be used to purchase a copy machine for the Sandy Elementary School office.

Locally, cheese will be available this Saturday, Feb. 19, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at Kelso School, 34651 SE Kelso Road.

Residents will be asked

to present a driver's license, voter registration card or some form of identification with name and address.

In order to be eligible for the surplus cheese, area

residents will have to meet these guidelines: a family of one must have a gross monthly income below \$487.50; two, \$648; three, \$808.33; four, \$968.75; five, \$1,129.17; six, \$1,289.58.
