

Auction boosts lunch program

The Sandy Senior Center is hosting an evening of dining and fun that members hope will help fund a noontime hot lunch meal for another year.

Next Friday evening, March 18, the center will host a gala turkey dinner with all the fixings from 5:30 to 7 p.m. to raise money to help support the Loaves and Fishes meals served at the center daily.

Participants will also have an opportunity to take home some valuable items during an after-dinner auction, featuring a color television, exercise cycle and automotive tune-up. For those who don't fancy the call of the auctioneer, cards and other games will also be on hand.

Local community services director Sandra Potter Marquardt, who oversees the day-to-day operation of the center, said each facility that serves the daily meal has to come up with some of the money to pay its own way.

The local senior center is expected to raise \$4,000 as its portion this year. Marquardt hopes to have \$1,500 raised by June 30 through fund-raisers like the dinner and auction, and through local donations.

She said the local responsibility for support of the program increases every year. Along with local money, funds come

Hospice announces spring classes

A 10-week course in hospice care begins its weekly Monday night schedule March 28 at Mt. Hood Community College.

The three credit hour class will meet 7-10 p.m. in Room 1001 at the college. Registration is handled by the local Mt. Hood Hospice office at 668-9000.

The course is intended for individuals who are interested in becoming hospice volunteers, or have a personal interest in the hospice concept of care.

Mt. Hood Hospice is a health care service which offers care and support to

the terminally ill and members of their families in East Multnomah and Clackamas County areas. Emphasis is on pain and symptom control, home care and support for the family through the whole difficult experience.

The full hospice health service program is delivered by a specially-trained interdisciplinary team, on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Cost for the complete course is \$30. Texts to be used are "The Hospice Movement" by Sandol Stoddard and "A Spirit

Soars" by Tom Pinkson.

Following the introductory session, other hospice concerns to be presented will be "Terminal Illness—Medical Overview," "Religion, Suffering, Suicide," "Psycho-Social Needs," "Nursing," "Nur-

sing II," "Funeral and Closure," "Dynamics of Death and Dying," "Grief and Bereavement," and "Overview and Panel Discussion."

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City delays market decision

Final decision on a minor land partition that would pave the way for construction of a new Plaid Pantry market in Sandy was delayed last Wednesday until April 6.

The Portland-based convenience store chain would purchase the eastern half of property owned by Portland General Electric if the partition is approved. The property is at the southeast corner of Pioneer Boulevard and Bluff Road.

A public hearing, requested by PGE, will be continued at 8 p.m. April 6 at the Sandy Community Center prior to a joint meeting of the planning commission and city council.

In his recommendation to the local planning commission, City Planner Don Wilson said the partition should be approved without a 25-foot access across the back of the PGE property that would link Bluff Road with the new market.

He said the city staff has "serious reservations that the development of this ac-

cessway would constitute a significant traffic problem.

The proposed access easement is poorly aligned with the intersection of Sunset Street and Bluff Road, creating a conflict in cross-lane left-hand turns in both directions, Wilson said.

Even if this problem were solved, he added, there would remain a line-of-sight problem along Bluff Road in both directions.

"The largest conflict would be for traffic exiting the easement, although accessing traffic from Bluff

Road would also be at risk," Wilson said. Line-of-site problems are created by two dips in Bluff Road, both of sufficient depth to hide an oncoming vehicle.

Wilson has asked Plaid Pantry to conduct a traffic study with additional information for the April 6 meeting.

In other action, the plan-

ning commission approved annexation of 7.67 acres owned by McCall Oil into the city. The site is on the north side of Highway 26, adjacent to the Mercury Development shopping center site on the west end of town.

City zoning for the site was deferred until a more detailed strategy is in hand for providing city water service to the property.

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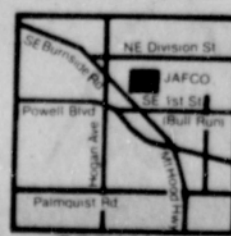
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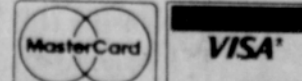
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
