Husband Roy was on vacation at the time, so they jumped into the hunt a bit late but enthusiastically. They made four or five trips down to the Multnomah Kennel Club where the key was taped to a light pole labeled "B-1."

They were joined by a steady stream of treasure hunters who followed clues in The Post, Gresham Outlook, KRDR and posted in Carlson Chevrolet. Some

dismantled a fire hydrant in search of the key, while others frisked "Rusty," the pace rabbit at the track, for the hidden key. Grounds keepers played along congenially.

"We knew by most of the clues it had to be on a light post," Mrs. Bernaix said. "Then Saturday we went down there and looked over the poles, but it was raining too hard to look up. Then when the sun came out, the tape showed."

A letter and key had been taped to the top of the light post.

They actually found the

key last Wednesday.

"My sister called and said she thought it was on B-1," Mrs. Bernaix said. "I said, 'I know,' but we haven't been able to get out there."

In their spare time, the couple read "Games Magazine" and solve cryptograms.

Instructor Mary O'Neil leads the class that begins April 4 and meets Monday and Wednesday evenings at the Sandy Elementary School gym from 7 to 8 p.m. for eight weeks.

More conventional trips to fitness will be offered during morning exercise for all ages, beginning April 4 and meeting Mondays and Thursdays from 9 to 10 a.m. at the Sandy Community Center.

For folks who wake up and go to work, or wake up after 10 a.m., evening exercise begins April 11 and meets Mondays and Wednesdays from 7 to 8 p.m. at the community center.

Recreational volleyball begins April 13, at 7 p.m., in the Kelso Grade School gym. Volleyball and net are provided.

Weekly Tumbling for Tots, for ages 3 to 5, rolls into action April 21 at the Sandy Community Center from 3 to 4 p.m. If there is enough interest, a 4-5 p.m. session will be added. There are six classes in the series.

For older youngsters, 6 to 8 and 9 to 12 years old, gymnastics classes begin May 2 at Sandy High School. The twice-weekly classes, Monday and Thursday, will run nine weeks.

Friday evening will again be Community Card Night at the Sandy Community/Senior Center. Pinochle, bridge and cribbage games will be available for novice or expert. It begins April 1 at 7:30 p.m.

Three special weekend activities are planned this spring.

A half-day raft trip down the Sandy River from Ox-bow Park to Lewis and Clark State Park will be the first. No experience is needed for the trip May 7.

Rafts, paddles, transportation to and from the river will be provided. All voyagers need is their own sack lunch.

A Frisbee tournament is planned May 21 at the lower Cedar Ridge Field at 10 a.m.

Ribbons and trophies will be awarded for first and second place winners in a nine hole Frisbee golf tournament, longest toss competition—broken into age groups from 3 to 12—and a Frisbee catching dog, fanciest duo competition.
