Ski shop owner cited for delays

Otto Rode, operator of a new ski rental and Scandinavian gift shop of Pioneer Boulevard in Sandy, has been cited into Sandy Municipal Court for failure to comply with a city ordinance that requires off-street parking for his customers.

He was cited May 9, deadline given him by City Hall for installation of a temporary gravel lot for two cars between his converted house and an adjacent church.

Rode, who recently moved his shop from Lake Oswego, has been given a deadline in August to pave his required two-car parking lot.

He maintains, however, that installation of a front sidewalk with an entrance-exit into his lot robbed him of one ready parking spot on Pioneer in front of his shop.

He earlier asked the city council for additional time

to install his driveway for two off-street parking spots next to his building, but was denied.

He faces another hurdle with the city's design-review board and building inspector over his hand-lettered rooftop sign with exposed beams.

Advised the sign doesn't conform to city code, Rode anticipates covering the exposed beams but balks at more professional lettering he doesn't consider any

more aesthetically pleasing.

Rode may get a helping hand with installation of his gravel parking lot later this week from Sandy High School Honor Society volunteers, organized by school advisor Peg Hart.

The gravel was donated by John West of Government Camp.

Earlier Sandy High Future Farmers of America members, organized by advisor Les

Geren, helped Rode install his required front sidewalk.

Rode was cited by Sandy Police on behalf of the city building department for violation of city ordinance, Sec. 17.42, with instructions to appear 2 p.m. May 19 in municipal court.

Rode, who rents cross-country skis, complained Thursday happens to be his regular day for skiing and said he would like a postponement.

Approximately 30 people in the community participated in Sandy Elementary School's career days.

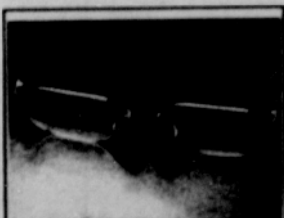
According to Mary Marshall, former Parent Teacher Club president and career days chairman, the two days' worth of demonstrations and speeches were a success.

"I thought it went very well," Marshall said. "I was extremely pleased with it. All the kids I talked to, including my own, really enjoyed it."

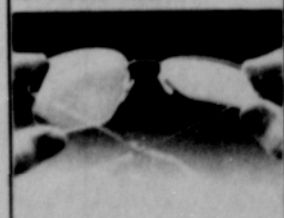
"I thought everybody who participated did a tremendous job. I'd just like to give a big thanks to all of them."

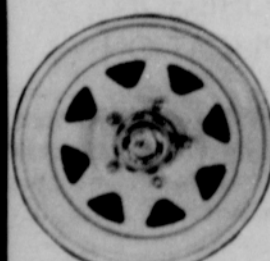

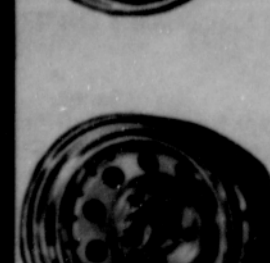

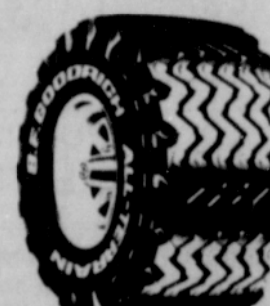
