Daugherty's put sets new state mark

Paige Daugherty set a new state's best mark in the shot with a 42-2 toss at the Barlow Invitational last week.

Coach Randy Hutchinson was pleased with the throw and the first-place points but added, "The next time we go someplace and she sings the national anthem, I want 10 points."

The boys were second against what Hutchinson considered a "pretty good field," as evidenced by the times and marks. The girls were fourth, finishing out of third by a point.

"Our boys have got so darned competitive I can't hardly believe it," Hutchinson said.

Scott Skipper turned in his best throw of the season in the javelin, a

216-8. "He's coming right along," Hutchinson said.

Skipper won over a field that included the state's best four javelin throwers, including Steve Belmore of Gresham, whose 222-foot throw earlier this season was the second best in the nation.

Skipper's best is a 218-7, thrown in Junior Olympic competition last year.

Skipper also won the hammer throw, setting a school record with a 114-9. Perry Grant was second with a 94-8.

Hutchinson said they worked on the hammer throw for about a week before the meet. It was the only time they threw the hammer this season, but he said letting them work on it is

a good diversion.

Skipper was second in the discus throw with a toss of 149-4, and Mike Marleau was third with a toss of 149-3. Skipper was also second in the shot with a toss of 51-4.

In another event that's not a regular in Oregon high school track, Crystal Calkins was second in the triple jump with a 31-5.

Sam Romey ran his "most competitive race of the season, in my opinion," Hutchinson said. Romey won the 1500 in 4:04.2, setting a meet record. He also owns the meet record in the 3000. Tom Sera of Beaverton was second in 4:04.9.

The Pioneers have been competing in the Barlow Invitational for several years, off and on. It was the 10th an-

nual running of the meet.

Romey and Tyson Cummins were also credited with performing well in the mile relay, which set a PR for third with a 3:28.6.

"We're still not where we're capable of being. We had a few people who were ill and didn't run well and we still had a 28," Hutchinson said.

The short relay team finished third, having run a 45.0. Said Hutchinson, "Don't ask me how?" Ryan Coombs, Bryan Prosser, Darren Ford and Mark Beck comprise the short relay team.

The girls short relay team also turned in a good time, a 51.5 for second. Hutchinson said the girls should place well at district with that

time.

Sandy Roberts, Coral Howell, Crystal Calkins and Lisa Hassett comprise the short relay team.

Calkins was sixth in the long jump (15-11), and Sharon Jensen was third, with a 16-4 1/4 jump.

Chris Muff was third in the javelin with a throw of 122-8, and Daugherty was second in the discus with a 112.

Brian Reick "ran well," finishing third in the 3000 with a 9:17, and Phil Burks was sixth with a 9:26, a personal record.

Jensen was second in the 1500 with a 5:01, and Donna Nelson was sixth in the 3000 with an 11:26.

Sophomore Amy Lynch was second in the hurdles and on the way to a good time when she caught her trail

leg on the last hurdle and "bit it," Hutchinson said. She scrapped one knee especially bad and he's hoping she'll still be able to compete in the district meet May 18 and 19.

"I'm really glad she came out," Hutchinson said of Lynch. "She's got a lot of potential. This is not to write off this year, but in a couple of years she'll be real tough."

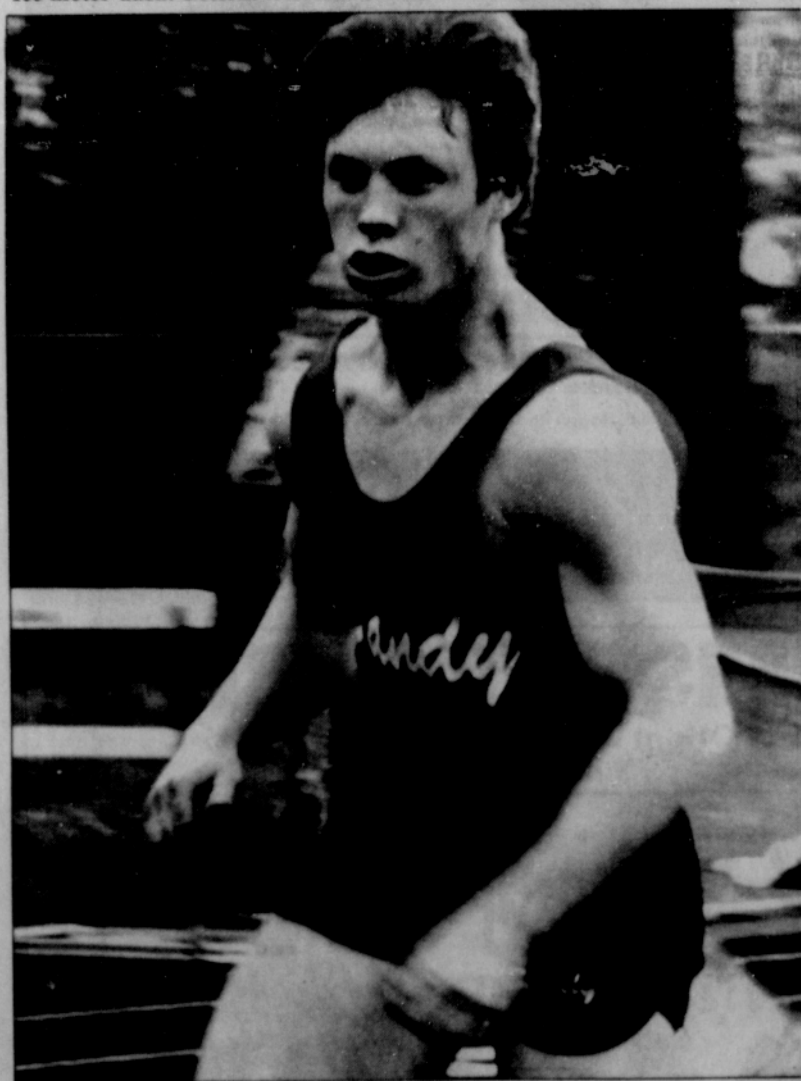
Blackburn finished sixth in the 100 hurdles, but was not picked, Hutchinson said.

Ford and Mark Beck both made the finals in the 200, with Ford finishing sixth with a 23.7. Beck ran a 23.8.

Prosser was sixth in the 100 with an 11.8, and Calkins was fifth with a 13.4. Hassett, running with a pulled hamstring, was fifth in the 200.

1-0 loss ends team's 4-game win streak

A 1-0 loss Tuesday marred a Sandy winning streak that was stretched to four games.

Mike Lund had four hits in five at-bats, including three home runs and eight RBI, to highlight an 18-8 win over Parkrose last week.

Coach John Rohr said Lund has some long-ball power. "Mike is a notorious late-season hitter."

Brad Pearson's first hit of the season was a grand-slam homer. In addition, Stu Hoffman was three for four with four stolen bases, and Jerry Bennett was three for four with three RBI.

Bennett turned around and threw a four-hitter Friday against Reynolds, "his best game this year," Rohr said.

Lund was two for four with two RBI, which included a two-run double in the sixth.

Don Bennett was two for two, and Hoffman was two for three with two RBI.

Monday against The Dalles it was Steve "Moe" Contreras' two-run double that got things started in the third inning. Hoffman knocked in Contreras for the tying run.

In the fifth Bennett's two-run single gave the Pioneers the 5-3 lead and final score.

Bennett gave up three runs in the first two innings, but after that "he got everything together and threw real well," Rohr said.

"We're getting to where we're starting to play some good, consistent ball," Rohr said. "Plus, we're getting the breaks at the right time. We're getting the hits when we need 'em now."

"Not to put the pressure on, but

when Jerry and Stu are hitting for us, we win ball games. They're our money men."

Don Bennett has also been playing well as of late, Rohr said.

In addition the pitching staff of Jerry Bennett, Pearson, Alan Jensen, Jason Kern and Lund are also "keeping us in ball games."

The bubble burst Tuesday in a makeup game at Gresham. The Pioneers dropped to 6-8 in the MHC and are out of the chase for a playoff berth. They faced Barlow Wednesday, and play David Douglas Friday.

"I think we've proven we can play in a tough league," Rohr said after the 1-0 loss to Gresham.

"We played really good defense," Rohr said, "and Brad Pearson pitched a really good ball game."

The Gophers won the game in the bottom on the seventh, scoring a run on a single. Gresham is playing for the MHC title.

Contreras was two for four, and Jerry Bennett contributed a double.

District champion aims for state title

SUHS sophomore Kevin Beaudoin was only one-over par Friday going into the 16th hole at Pleasant Valley in the District Golf Tournament.

And then on the 16th, with the wind blowing "at least 40 miles per hour," Beaudoin used a driver, a 6-iron and a wedge before finally chipping onto the green.

"I was pretty upset by then," he said.

He was four over on the last three holes, finishing with a five-over 77.

It was still good enough for the district championship. Last year he missed qualifying for state as a medalist by two strokes. About his chances at state Monday and Tuesday at Glendoveer, he said, "I think I'm hitting the ball well enough to

win it.

"I like the course. It's a course where you can get a good score." He said winning it is a matter of having a good couple of days. "Anybody could win, really."

The Pioneers dropped from third to fourth in the Mt. Hood Conference after finishing fifth in the district meet. David Douglas pulled off a surprise win Friday. "I don't know where that came from," Beaudoin said. "That was a little unreal."

In the final MHC standings Barlow was first, Gresham second, and David Douglas third.

"We thought we could do it (beat Gresham and earn a state playoff berth). I think that's what might have done it. We may have played too cautiously."

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
