Rites held for Boring resident



Ralph Kelso

Funeral services were held Monday for Boring resident Ralph Roland Kelso in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. He died May 12 at Kaiser Sunnyside Hospital after a lengthy illness. He was 45.

Born June 7, 1937 in New Plymouth, Idaho, he grew up in Oregon and Idaho, graduating from high school at Couer d'Alene, Idaho. He attended Central Bible College in Springfield, Mo., where he met Rosalee J. Reynolds. They were later married in Kansas on Sept. 14, 1957.

They remained in Kansas where Mr. Kelso worked as a data processor for Boeing Aircraft. They moved to Portland in 1963 and he continued working as a

data processor. Since 1965 he had been employed with the Bank of California in computer operations as a supervisor and trouble shooter.

The Kelsoes have lived in Boring since 1971. He enjoyed the hunting and fishing and attend Sandy Assembly of God Church.

Survivors include his wife Rosalee; three children, Rollin Kelso of Milwaukie, Rhonda Carroll of Gresham and Rodger Kelso of Portland; his father and step-mother, Ralph and Marie Kelso of Washington; three sisters, Doris Landis of Montana, Hilda Lundervold of Portland; a brother, Raymond Kelso of Washington, and three grandchildren.

Interment was at Lincoln Memorial Park in Portland.

Victor Bodley

Longtime Sandy area resident Victor Bodley died May 16 in Gresham. He was 96.

Funeral service will be held today, May 19, at 1 p.m. in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home.

Mr. Bodley was born Oct. 12, 1886 in a farmhouse at 4th and Powell. He grew up

in that area, attending Clinton Kelly and South Mt. Tabor schools.

After completing his education, he worked at several occupations in Portland before moving to the Dover area in 1907 to farm. Shortly after moving to Dover, he was instrumental in getting telephone service to the Dover and Firwood areas.

Mr. Bodley met Leah Morrison in 1910 and they married July 30, 1913 in Portland. They lived in Dover until 1914 when they moved to Portland where he worked for Southern Pacific Railroad and at the shipyards.

When the shipyards closed in 1920, the Bodleys returned to the Dover area to raise strawberries, his lifetime occupation. He also operated a sawmill from 1945 to 1955. After he retired they moved to Sandy in 1967.

Mr. and Mrs. Bodley joined the Sandy Grange in 1933. He held many offices and was a 7th degree member. He and his wife also belong to the Sandy Pioneer Association and were elected King and Queen of the group in 1967. He was also a member of the Sandy Senior Center and Sandy Golden Age Club.

His wife preceded him in death in January 1983.

He is survived by two sons, Robert of Eugene and Wayne of Sandy; his brother, Donald of Sandy; a grandson, Rick Bodley and two great-grandchildren.

The family suggests memorials be made to the Sandy Senior Center or the Sandy Grange in his memory.

Hugh Johnson

Memorial service for former area resident Hugh Johnson will be held Saturday, May 21, at 1 p.m. in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home.

He died May 10 at his Redmond home. He was 68. Born July 28, 1914 to Walter and Grace Johnson in Rockwell City, Iowa, he was raised on a farm in Iowa until his family moved to California when he was in high school.

He completed his high school education at a military academy. His football ability took him to the University of Oklahoma where he furthered his education and played football.

He entered the Army Air Corps during World War II with the desire to be a pilot, only to learn he was two days over the age limit for pilot training. Serving as a radio operator and gunner, he was involved in 30 missions in Europe. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal and European Theater Ribbon. Before his discharge, he became qualified as a pilot.

His work for the REA in Roseburg brought him to the Sandy-Gresham area to work for PGE until his retirement.

After his retirement, he returned to his love of farm life at Redmond.

He is survived by his sister, Gretchen Chilton of Sandy; three brothers, Harry and Lee Johnson, both of California, and Dick Johnson of Arizona.

EXPLORE NEW ENGLAND'S FOLIAGE COUNTRY

Does the fall foliage season arrive each year before you've had a chance to make your plans? Don't let it get away from you this time.

One of the itineraries, a 16-day program, even visits the site of the Academy Award-winning movie, "On Golden Pond." That's in the White Mountain region of New Hampshire.
