

Always something to keep busy

Lamkes celebrate 30 years of local service

In the 30 years he's operated his Sandy dental practice, when Dr. Al Lamke hasn't been busy with patients, he's found plenty to do.

It reflects one of the basic philosophies he brought to his stay in the community: "You've got to have something to keep you busy."

When he moved his family to Sandy to join the practice of Dr. Schneider in an office above what is now the Health House, the Lamkes found the Cub Scout troop had dwindled into near oblivion.

The doctor and his wife, Helen, took it on as a project to get the community reinterested in Cub Scouting and drafted Cliff Sandstrom as first scoutmaster.

Their interest continued through Boy Scouts. When no one was available to chaperone the Scouts at summer camp, Helen busied herself a week in advance cancelling appointments, and "Doc would go."

Helen and Bob Gulvin chauffeured the Scouts to their overnights, Gulvin leading the way and Helen following behind, picking up what the Scouts dropped and helping lug a foot locker that made its way on campouts—loaded with just a couple cooking pots.

Their Scouting interests carried over into other community projects. For 30 years the couple has cleaned and painted toys for the annual Christmas basket project.

"She's got to take credit for most of it," the doctor defers to his wife.

They start just after Thanksgiving and work until three or four days before Christmas, unstuffing and washing Teddy bear skins, then stuffing them again, fine-tuning

and repainting cars and trucks.

"If we had just one extra room in the house we could use it for that," Al said. "It's a big job. They're all over the place for about a month."

The Lamkes have lived a few miles east of Sandy since their arrival in 1953. Dr. Lamke was a year out of the University of Oregon Dental School in

Portland before it moved up on Marquam Hill. He spent a year with Dr. William Howe in Portland before the move.

Since his arrival he's followed suit, taking in young dentists who have since established their own practices in the area.

The town has changed tremendously, he said, the other day in the laboratory of

his office in the lower level of Cedar Plaza.

"This side of the street was a jungle," he said, pointing out at Meinig Park, "and a lot of buildings have moved." Lamke made the move to his present location in 1966.

He moved west from his native South Dakota in 1942 after being called home when

his father became ill while Al was in the service. In October that year the Armed Forces called him back. After he was discharged, he was at Vanport College (now Portland State University) the day it opened its doors.

He'd been out of school for nine years so he spent two years and a quarter brushing up for his time in dental school.

In the years since, he's filled two or three file cabinets with names of patients who have come through his doors.

"I have no idea," he said, considering how many names are in the filing cabinet. "I wouldn't have the foggiest idea."

"At one time, Dr. Schneider and I were the only dentists in the whole area, Estacada, the mountain, Boring and then finally they got a dentist in Estacada in about 1960."

His office is filled with cartoons set in dental offices, perhaps beating the patients who want to pull the latest zinger to the punch. Through the years, his four children have helped out in the office during summers. Helen, too, takes her turns behind the receptionist chair.

Their children, now grown, are Lynn Fischer, Ned Lamke and Brian Lamke, all of Sandy, and Nola Leibbrand of Colton.

The Lamkes, through their interests in American Field Service, also had a student visitor from Chile for a year. He returned 10 years later, an anesthesiologist, a visit the Lamkes remember fondly.

The Lamkes will host an open house at the Cedar Plaza office June 11 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. for patients and friends to celebrate Dr. Lamke's practice in the Sandy area and the lives touched through finding "something to keep you busy."
