the area served by the local library.

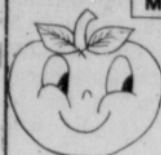
To apply for a position, write a short letter of interest to Sandy Public Library, P.O. Box 578, Sandy, OR 97055. Application deadline is June 16.

'Wellness Is...' Health Care Clinic

...Provides primary health care to adolescents and adults. Examples of care are:

1. Yearly physical exams that include blood pressure monitoring, heart, lung, abdomen, thyroid, and skin assessment. Women's health care which includes PAP smears and breast exams.
2. Assessment and treatment of minor emergencies, lacerations, infections, chronic illness (asthma, diabetes, etc.), minor emotional crisis, and skin lesions.
3. Counseling and guidance for birth control, family planning, pregnancy tests, and crises of daily living.
4. Health education and support groups.
5. Home visits and skilled nursing care for the homebound, elderly, and dying person.
6. Community services that include foot clinics, health forums, resource referral, and formal educational programs.
