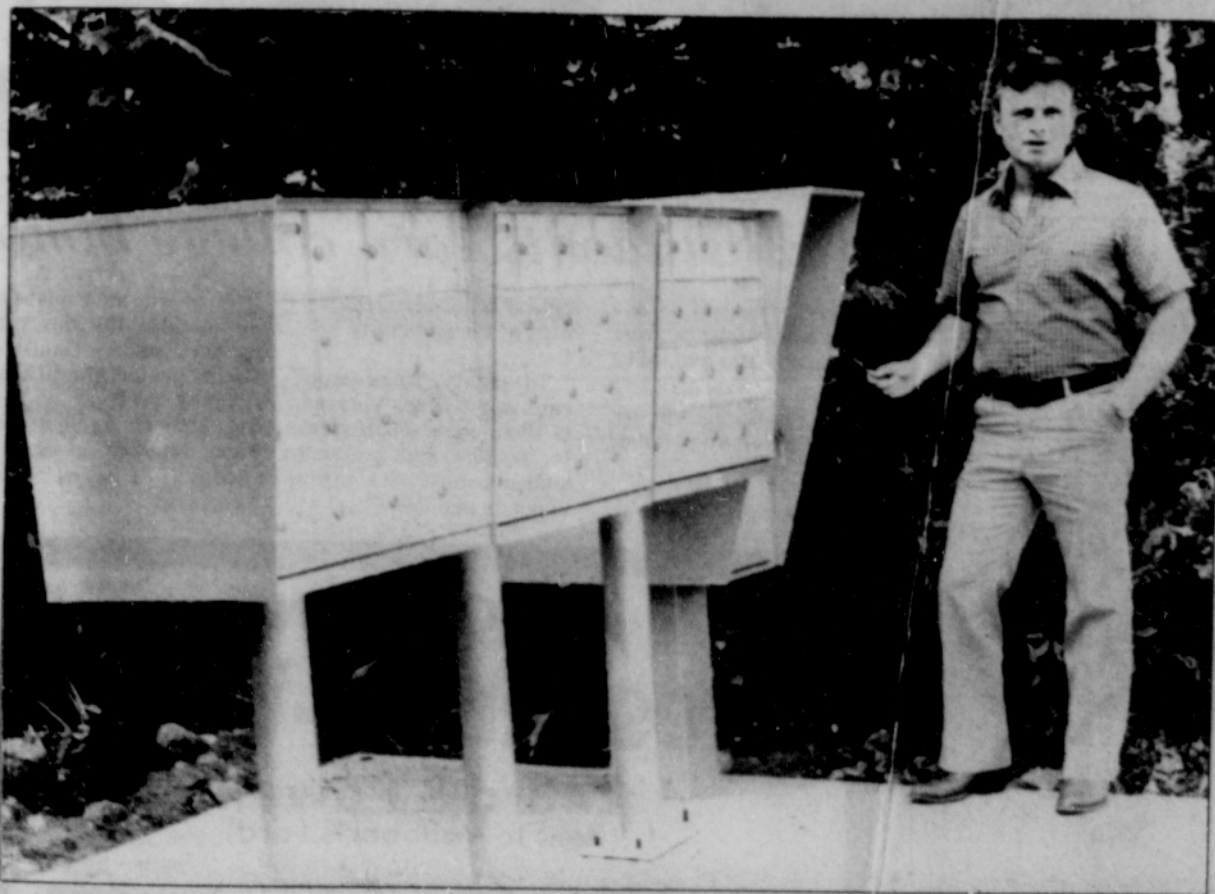




John Rizzo looks over new mail center installed at Haugen. Timberline Rim to honor former postmaster Juanita

Improved mail service seen at Rim

Residents of Timberline Rim near Brightwood will soon receive their mail closer to home and in the process honor former long-time Brightwood postmaster Juanita Haugen.

The owner's association for the housing development is providing a landscaped information center where the U.S. Postal Service is installing new Neighborhood Delivery Collection Box Units. The center is to be named for Haugen, who began procedures to acquire the NDCBU's for the

homeowners. The boxes will be installed at two sites in the Rim. The first unit, containing 30 individual boxes and a parcel and collection box is located in the Rim's North Side section. That unit is nearly complete.

The main unit, containing approximately 450 boxes will be installed near the Rim's main entrance. Marilyn Peterson, administrative assistant at the Rim, said the new units will eliminate some traffic problems. The current mailboxes are located very

close to Barlow Trail Road and vehicles sometimes have to stop on the highway while residents get their mail, creating a potential hazard.

"The information center and boxes will be placed farther from the entrance, making it safer for vehicles and for schoolchildren catching buses in the area," said Peterson.

According to Bruce Otto of the postal service, the NDCBU's could generate savings of more than \$10,000 yearly when they are at full capacity.

"It costs about \$69 a year

for delivery to a standard mailbox," said Otto. "The NDCBU's reduce that to \$43 a year."

Otto said that although there had been no "real malicious vandalism" in that area, the units eliminate a potential for mail theft. Each resident will have a keyed mailbox and access to parcel delivery.

Peterson said the information center will provide residents with a place to keep up with events taking place at Timberline Rim and other areas.

Grocers crack down on shoplifters

Seven Sandy residents were cited by local police this week after they were stopped by workers in two grocery stores and charged with shoplifting.

after taking two cans of soda pop. Donna Marie Messana, 21, of Sandy was cited and released after an incident involving a pack of cigarettes and Nancy Louise Nelson, 34, of Sandy was cited and released after she allegedly took packages of cigarettes.

Clifford Nelson of Sandy reported last Thursday morning that someone had burglarized his residence and taken two chainsaws

and one boat motor. Jessie Owen Sargent, 21, of Sandy escaped injury early Friday morning when the car he was driving left Bluff Road near Olson Street and struck a utility pole. Charles Smay of Sandy told Sandy police Saturday evening that someone took two hubcaps from his vehicle while it was parked in the Heritage Square parking lot around 7 p.m.

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In other business the Sandy Union High School board hired two mathematics instructors and a French teacher, and accepted the resignation of Jeannie Rossos, who wants to take care of new family obligations.

It was also announced that a tuition reimburse-

ment grievance was settled, and the district will pay for tuition accrued last school year. The cost will range from \$3,500 to \$5,000, Anderson said Tuesday.
