From the summer experience Smith feels they're ready to battle for a playoff spot. "I think all of us are eagerly awaiting next season and the opportunity to improve on our seventh-place finish," he said.

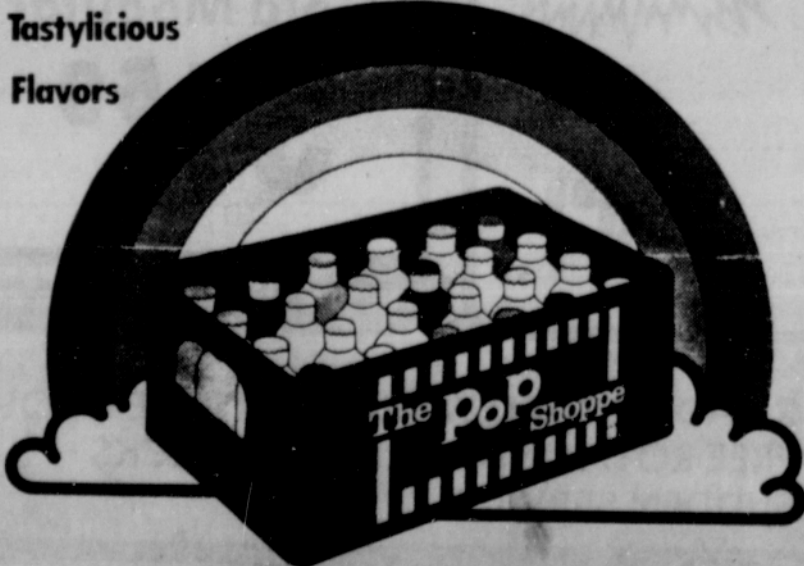
Chamber sets golf tourney
