Chris Mac Donald, coordinator, invites all women in the community to attend. Free babysitting is provided.

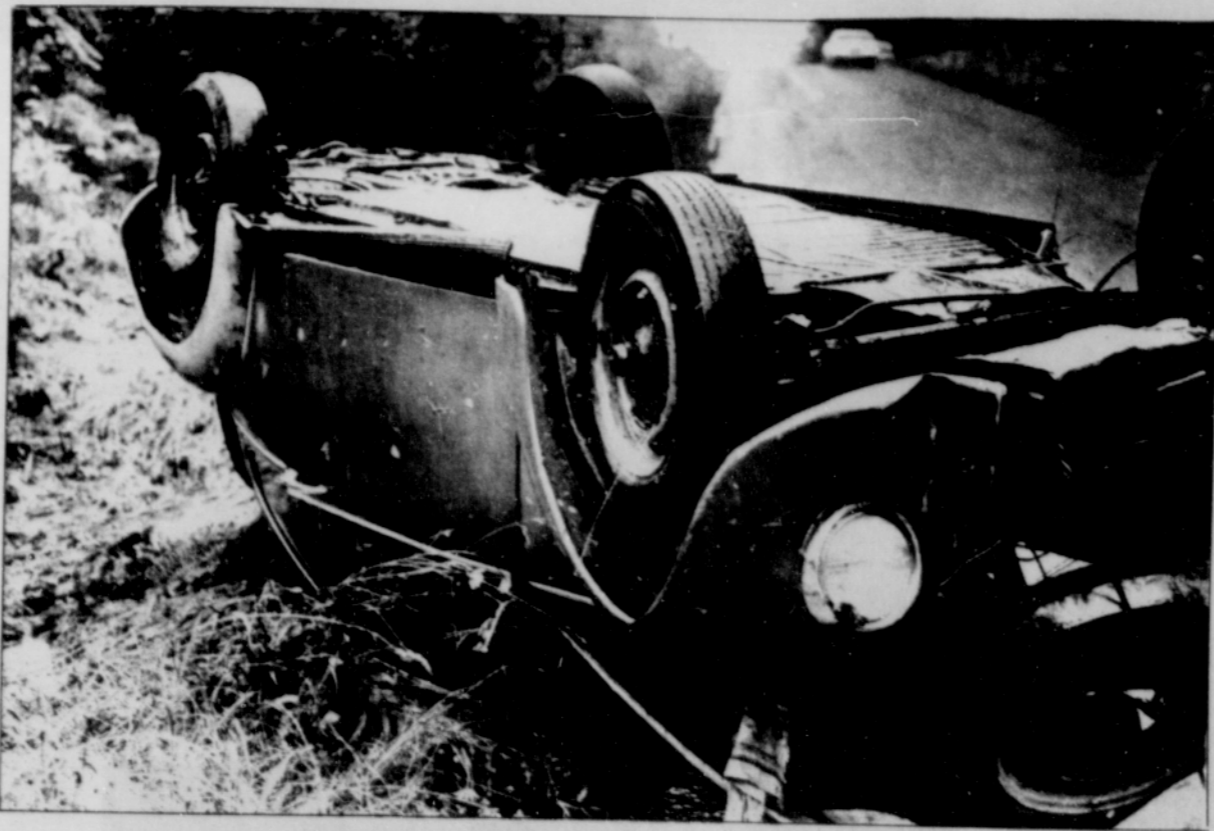

Work eyed in spring

Bluff Road repairs delayed

It will be at least next spring before the next stretch of North Bluff Road undergoes renovation.

City Manager Tom Reber, citing the lateness of the building season, a possible alternative funding source and a debt the city owes for another project, asked the Sandy City Council to postpone Phase II of the three-phase paving process begun last year.

After "some significant whittling" of street improvement funds during the budgeting process, the Bluff Road project was the lone street project targeted

for the new fiscal year. However, since the passage of the budget, discussions have concluded that this too will take the back burner for three reasons:

- It would be approximately Sept. 1 before the contract could be let and work begun.

- The city has initiated discussions with Clackamas Aid Seeking Federal Aid Secondary System funds for this road. An answer or idea of the possibility of funding won't be forthcoming until early 1984.

- The city owes Les Brown approximately

\$5,000 in oversizing costs he spent constructing Dubarko road to collector street standard. That debt will be paid from street improvement funds.

If the county chooses the local road project, it would be a complete reconstruction of the road, which is approximately five times the cost of the program begun last year. That would also last longer than the three-phased project.

"If we postpone this project until next spring, we may not have to do the project at all," said Reber,

"and if we did do the project we could combine it with funds from the next

fiscal year and have one project of a larger scope at that time."

In other action Monday night, the council:

- Appointed Randy Oliver and Ken Humbert to the Library Board and recognized long-time board members Lucille Ogden and Al Morner. Also honored with certificates were former Recreation Commission members Gus DePaape, Howard Berger and Gary Davidson.

—Agreed to spend \$5,000 to purchase materials and rent equipment to continue the sanitary sewer infiltration reduction program.

Gleaners pick for others

The Gleaners of Clackamas County want to remind residents that there are people in their neighborhood who have a hard time meeting basic nutritional needs.

Yet, food in the area is often wasted or left to rot in fields and gardens. Gleaning gets this food that would normally rot to those in need.

Gleaners gather and share crops that remain after harvest. Low to moderate income people who qualify for the program are required to have an adoptee—someone who can't physically go to the field to pick.

Food is shared with this adoptee and surplus is distributed through local centers, like the Sandy Community Action Center, to supplement and meet emergency food needs.

The food is donated by Clackamas County farmers and gardeners.

Food also come from family gardeners whose green thumbs produce an extra 25 pounds of green beans or 50 ears of corn, which may be claimed as a charitable deduction.

Last year Gleaners of Clackamas County gathered more than 270,000

pounds of edibles and served more than 700 households. They are seeking help again this year.

Local growers with surplus to donate or persons who believe they qualify as a gleaner are asked to call Clackamas County Community Action Agency at 655-8640 or the Interagency Food Bank at 223-1050.
