Despite rainy weather

Outlook bright during first camp

For longtime members and friends of the Oral Hull Foundation for the Blind this week is like a dream come true.

After years of working to improve the local park for the blind, the foundation is playing host to its first summer camp. And organizers and campers are sharing in the excitement.

"For amateurs, we've done a tremendous job," joked volunteer Nancy Hutchinson of Sandy, who scheduled the week's events.

"It was quite a venture," agreed Marie Webb of the foundation. "We had such short notice and we didn't get started until April."

Originally the foundation planned to host the annual Lions Club camp but when that fell through, members and volunteers took steps to host the camp themselves.

With 45 campers from throughout Oregon and Washington filling the mobile homes and Philbin Hall dormitory at the park their work evidently paid off.

"A finer group of people, you couldn't meet," said Nancy. You would also be hard-pressed to find a wider array of activities for camper participation.

Sunday, 27 campers took a 5.2-mile hike along the Old Salmon River Trail, assisted by members of the Chancellor Club of Portland. Monday, more than 30 campers spent the afternoon boating, fishing and swimming at Roslyn Lake. A treasure hunt was held Tuesday in the Garden of Enchantment.

Other plans included a trip over historic Barlow Trail today, a week-long fishing derby and an afternoon Friday of horseback riding, bowling or a tea party.

Along with the special activities, day-to-day activities include craft sessions taught by local volunteers, an exercise class each morning, games and biking, and the camp's very own radio station OHFB which features "all-foaled-up weather" and Dear Gabby to go along with daily breakfast.

Friday evening the camp will hand out fishing derby prizes and

penalties at a Kangaroo Court, noting special fines for such things as talking after lights-out or catching all the small fish in the pond.

Monday evening, the campers were treated to a two-hour musical show when "Broadway'n Jazz," a group of local musicians and singers, performed.

"They were just terrific," Marie said. "I thought it was so nice of them to come and play all evening for us."

The Garden of Enchantment Recreation Assistance Fund helped make camping easier for some of the visitors, supplementing what fees couldn't be met by campers.

"Anyone who couldn't pay the whole \$98, they helped," Marie noted. "In some cases, they paid up to \$73."

But money isn't the foundation's point in hosting the get-together, Nancy said. It's fun.

Marie agreed. "We tell them there's nothing compulsory. We just want them to enjoy themselves."

Recycling notes landmark

July marks the five-year anniversary of Oregon's Used Oil Recycling Program.

The 1977 Oregon Legislature directed the Department of Environmental Quality to start the program in 1978 to promote the recycling of

used motor oil. In the five years of the program, Oregonians who change their own oil have recycled more than 1 million gallons of used oil at collection depots around the state. Locally, the collection depot is at Sandy Arco, 39555 Pioneer Blvd,
