

SUHS readies registration, changes

The first signs of the approaching school year are appearing for Sandy Union High School students next week.

Registration begins this Monday, Aug. 15, for freshmen and new students. Freshmen will start the school year Aug. 29.

Returning students will sign up Tuesday and Wednesday, and begin their school year Aug. 30. All sign-ups will be between 1 and 7 p.m. in the main building.

For returning students, those whose family names end with A through K will register Tuesday; students whose name ends in L through Z register Wednesday.

Schedules based on forecasts will be available at registration. Students who haven't registered, nor confirmed schedules by the end of registration, will not have a schedule to start the school year, according to Dick Harrison, director of Student Services.

Those who won't be available during registration may make arrangements to confirm schedules by contacting the school prior to registration. They will register after school starts.

Students who don't register during the normal registration period will be scheduled and registered Aug. 29 during normal school hours.

Counselors will be

available during registration to discuss programs with parents and students. Parents who want more time with counselors may make appointments for the afternoons of Aug. 22 and 23.

Registering students will need their current home address and phone number; both parents' places of employment, work addresses and work phone numbers, family doctor's name and phone number, and the name, address and phone number of a person to call in case of emergency.

Students who plan to go out for a sport will be asked to bring money to buy insurance or a proof of insurance statement. They

will also need a completed proof of insurance form, and money for the athletic towel fee and a student body card.

CHANGES AT SCHOOL

Along with starting school prior to Labor Day, the school has other changes for students this year, according to Superintendent Roberta Hutton.

School will dismiss at 2:54 p.m., creating a longer school day.

"We feel that the additional time will benefit students' academic progress," she said in a letter to district parents. "Along that same vein, our

intention is to operate a 'closed campus.'"

Students will remain on the school premises during the entire day, unless parents make a special request for medical appointments.

Among academic changes going into effect will be two years of mathematics required for incoming ninth-graders and the driver's education program will no longer be part of the health curriculum.

Plans are also underway to offer more advanced placement programs, particularly in English, foreign language and science.

County moves to enforce dog licensing ordinance

Dog owners had better make sure Fido has a license or they could face a fine under a new dog licensing ordinance in effect this week.

Clackamas County began enforcement of the ordinance Tuesday, according to a Sheriff's Department spokesman, with nine license inspectors who completed a training course last week. They will take now take up their new assignments to license the county's estimated 45,000 dogs.

The county ordinance requires every dog with canine teeth or six months

old to be licensed. Fees range from \$12 for fertile dogs to \$6 for spayed or neutered dogs.

Senior citizens may qualify for a \$3 discount on one dog per household. Owners licensing dogs after March 1 each year must pay a \$5 late fee.

Under special conditions some dog owners such as the blind or deaf owners of certified guide dogs and commercial kennel dogs may be entitled to exemptions under the ordinance.

Owners and keepers of dogs who violate the ordinance by failing to get a dog license may be cited to

appear before a hearings officer. Violation can result in a \$15 maximum penalty in addition to license fees.

Oregon law requires that a valid rabies certificate must be presented before a dog license may be issued.

Revenue from dog licenses are used to provide field services for the control of dogs, for dog shelter operations and to pay claims to persons whose livestock has been killed by marauding dogs.

Licenses are available at Sheriff's Animal Control Division, 2104 South Kaen Road in Oregon City.
