

Sandy Ridge grad dies

Funeral services for Sandy native Pauline Forman will be held tomorrow, Friday, Sept. 2 at 10:30 a.m. in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home.

Mrs. Forman died in a Portland hospital on Aug. 29 at the age of 83.

She was born Pauline Margaret Zogg at Sandy Ridge on April 2, 1900. Receiving her elementary education at Sandy Ridge, and attending high school in Estacada, she remained near her home until her marriage to Frank Forman in 1922.

The began their family in Estacada, moving to Antelope in 1930 where they operated a wheat and cattle ranch. They remained on their ranch except for a short time in the mid-1940s when they returned to Sandy.

In 1952 they retired and moved from Antelope back to Sandy to make their permanent home. Since residing in Sandy, she has belonged to the Rebekah Lodge, Sandy Presbyterian Church, Golden Age and Senior Citizens and the Sandy Cemetery Association. She also enjoyed gardening.

Her husband Frank preceded her in death. She is survived by her two children: Dorothy Blasen, Portland; Charles Forman, Antelope; stepdaughter Valeria Klann of Madras; sisters: Sophie Richey, Boring; and Sylvia Wilcox, Sandy; brothers: Lewis Zogg and Lynn Zogg, both in California; seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Top readers honored at library

Mark Herriford, 5, is "going to be in kindergarten one of these days." When he does start school he'll have a head start on some of his classmates, having read 13 books this summer in the Sandy library's Children's Summer Program.

"The philosophy behind the Children's Summer Program is to provide a positive atmosphere in which children are motivated to read and gain an appreciation of books," said Sue Newlands, librarian. "It is also focused upon preschoolers by encouraging parents to read to their children."

Not only does Herriford's parents read to him, but "four favorite cousins" do as well.

Herriford and others met at the library Friday and received certificates from Randy Oliver, PGE supervisor and a member of the board of directors for the library.

Approximately 50 children were registered for the reading program, with Heather Hauff having read 80 books.

The theme of the program was "Time Travels." Kari Kadunc, 10, and Kristi Kadunc, 11, both read 43 books. Though they have similar tastes in book — they like mysteries — they primarily read different books. Kari will be a

fifth grader at Firwood School, Kristi a sixth grader. Both like to ride their bikes, and Kristi enjoys playing the flute.

They decided to participate in the program after seeing a poster in the library. "We like to enter most contests, if we're eligible," Kristi said.

Anne Freshour, 8, read 40 books this summer. She likes to swim when she's not reading mysteries.

Joe Freshour, 4, received help reading 17 books. "Star Wars" was his favorite.

"One of the ideas behind the program is to offer an incentive for reading during the three months children are not exposed to books and the school environment," said Newlands. "Beginning readers often forget some of the basic skills during this period and it gives them an opportunity to continue where they left off."

Youngsters are encouraged to read 20 books during the summer. Those who read 10 qualify for the Governor's certificate. Parents may send a list of the books, the child's name, return address and signature of the parent to Verne Duncan, State Superintendent of Schools, Salem, 97310. In return a reading certificate signed by Governor Vic Atiyeh will be sent to the child.

Extension office allowed reprieve

The Clackamas County Extension Service, which includes Oregon's largest 4-H Club program, will be trimmed considerably less than originally anticipated in cost-cutting measures by the county.

On Aug. 10, a special Expenditures and Revenues committee recommended cutting \$54,167 from the county extension office.

Commissioners Monday voted a \$48,000 budget for the extension office. According to Clayton Wills of the extension service, this represents a 29 percent drop from the July 1 budget.

Wills said the cuts would be met by going to a four-day work week and eliminating two phone lines at the extension office.

Some had feared the popular 4-H program would be completely lost in budget cuts.

The cuts are part of an overall program to make up for a county general fund deficit of \$1.67 million. Other cuts mean layoffs, resignations, or early

retirement for up to 35 more county employees, and a loss of hours for others in addition to service cuts in some departments.

Two other programs that faced loss of support were also budgeted funds. The Rape Victim Advocate program received \$4,600 and the Veteran's Service office received \$10,700.

The most layoffs in any one department came in the assessor's office. Of the 58-member staff, 14 will be laid off.
