Caryn Priest and Timothy McCarthy are the owners of The Eager Beaver and have definite ideas about the kind of toys they sell.

"The whole theme of the store is educational, with the emphasis on developmental skills," said Priest.

Priest said she is concerned not only with the quality of toys, but the price as well.

"Everything is under retail price, we want to be able to compete with stores in town," she said.

"Being a parent has made me price conscious."

Priest has one son and one daughter and McCarthy, who teaches music at Welches School, has two sons and one daughter.

"It gives us a real advantage in knowing what kids want," said Priest.

McCarthy may have let a little of what he wants influence some decisions. He is a model train enthusiast and the store just happens to carry a line of model trains. An "Eager Beaver Train Club" is planned.

Priest said the store has received good reaction after only being open less than a month, with some

items down to only one or two in stock. She is expecting another shipment before the grand opening.

This is not the first business venture for Priest. She operates the We Care day care center and is attending Marylhurst College as a business major.

She said her experience at the day care center, her experience as a mother, and other experience work-

ing with children combine well with McCarthy's experience as a father and a teacher.

"We are still experimenting," she said. "We are looking for a balance between what the child wants, what the parent wants, and what we think would be a benefit to kids."

The store is located near Rippling River Resort, which helps business,

Priest said.

"Many of the people have stopped on the way home to take home a toy to Junior," she said.

Although McCarthy and Priest welcome the business of tourists, they want to serve local residents as well. During the grand opening, they are offering a 10 percent discount to all mountain residents.
