

Superintendent likes small schools

The new superintendent of Cottrell School is an advocate of small schools, feeling they do a better job of addressing the problems of the individual.

"I'm really looking forward to working here," said Kathleen Hieb. "This is the type of school I want to be involved with."

Hieb replaces long-time superintendent Jean Lundy.

Hieb, who has seven children (ages 21 through 27) and five grandchildren, has been in education since

1970. Her husband, Allan, works for Publishers Paper.

Hieb's first job as a teacher was at Boring Grade School, where she caught in both buildings and worked as a counselor. She was there for nine years, and began to take on administrative duties toward the end of her employment for the district.

She then served as principal-superintendent for four years at Sauvie

Island, a kindergarten through 12th grade district.

She was at Sauvie Island for four months when the "school burned down totally, to the last paper clip."

The district received \$700,000 from a fire insurance settlement. It was the first school in Oregon to receive a community facilities loan from Farmers Home Administration.

That loan for 5 percent, when the interest rate at the time was "about 18 per-

cent," will save taxpayers there about \$800,000 over 30 years in interest payments, according to Hieb.

Supervising the building of a school was an "interesting experience," Hieb said. She toured Firwood and Kelso schools for ideas at the time.

She has a bachelor's degree from Portland State University and a master's degree from Lewis & Clark College, both in education. She also has completed a certification program at

the University of Oregon for principals and superintendents, and is currently working for a certificate in counseling at PSU (at the time she worked as a counselor in Boring it wasn't required that she be certified).

At Cottrell School she'll manage a facility with about 178 students and 24 employees.

Hieb described the school as having a tight budget and a good basic program.

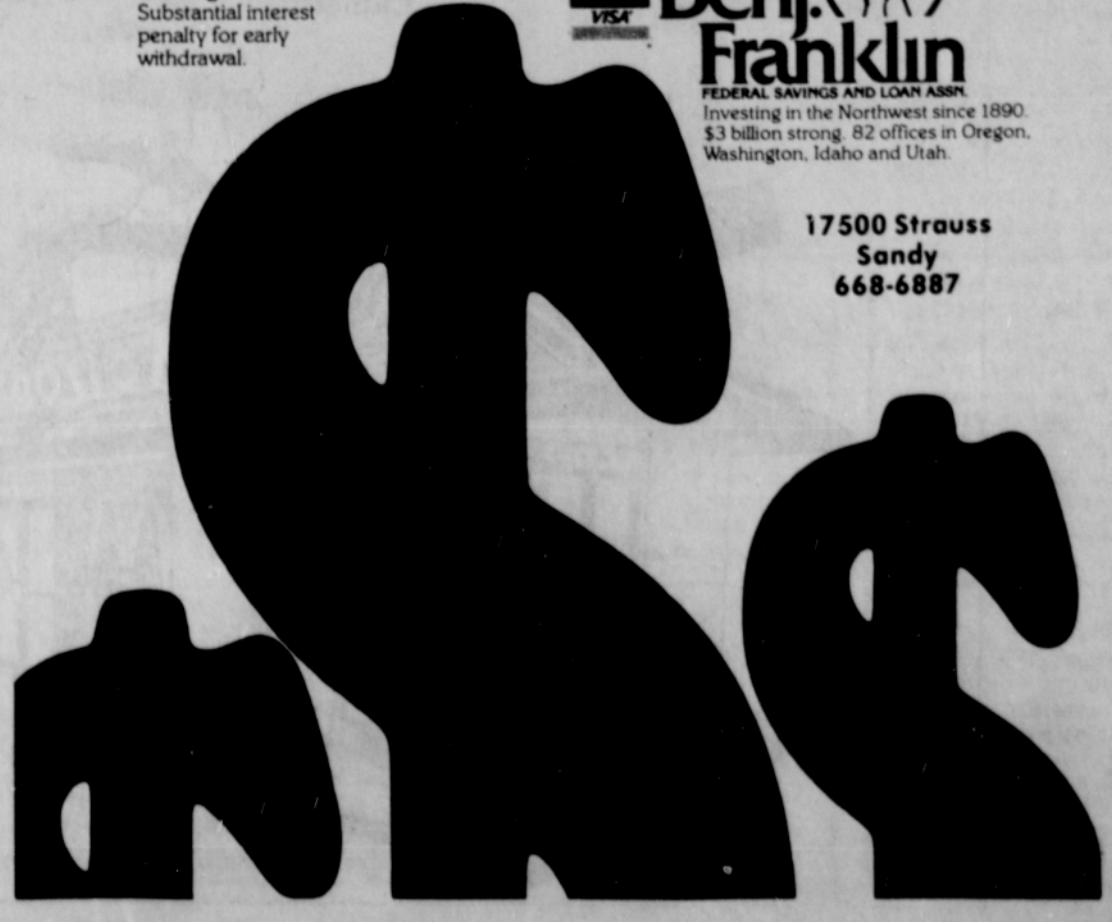
