"The wind made it difficult to clear the ball of the goal area, but the girls responded well," said Karsten.

Christa Searles was credited with an outstanding job as goalkeeper under difficult circumstances.

The game against ninth-ranked Barlow saw the game tied at the half, with Sandy's defense holding the ball almost completely away from their goal.

Not only did the Pioneers play tough, but Karsten said it was close to a win for Sandy.

"We had some shots missing by inches, just barely hitting the bar or posts, another few inches and it would have been our game," he said.

Barlow came out quickly in the second half and scored two goals to account for the 2-0 victory.

"He is a great athlete, with some training he could be one of the better runners," said Beymer.

Sam Romey fought a Reynolds runner, maintaining a slight edge over the entire course before slipping behind and settling for second in the final stretch. Romey, who has not

trained for two weeks because of an injury, was only two seconds behind the leader.

McMullen said he was encouraged by the girls' performance, though they lost to both schools. Freshman Becky Hewgley has been a "real surprise," he said, moving from just an average JV runner to a top varsity runner in less than a month. Hewgley has cut two minutes from her course time in that period.

"She has a lot of potential for the next three years," said McMullen.
