Frosh football strong at Sandy

Even though the Pioneer's freshman football team easily overhauled The Dalles 20-8 last week, they started the season with a sizable handicap. Sandy is the only school in the Mt. Hood Conference with neither a youth program or football in the feeder schools.

"It just means we have to progress twice as fast," said coach Lynn Harris, "we can create as good of an athlete as any in the league."

"The problem is if you rate the ideal player as a '10,' other schools are starting out with a '4' or a '5,'" he said.

"We start with '0' because of lack of experience."

Harris thinks there are good athletes to work with this year.

"We have both a larger turnout than in the past and physically bigger kids," he said.

This isn't all good news for Sandy

however, Harris cautions that the other teams also look stronger and bigger this year.

Harris said there is promise among the freshman, especially in the backfield players.

"On the line it takes experience before they can really develop," he said.

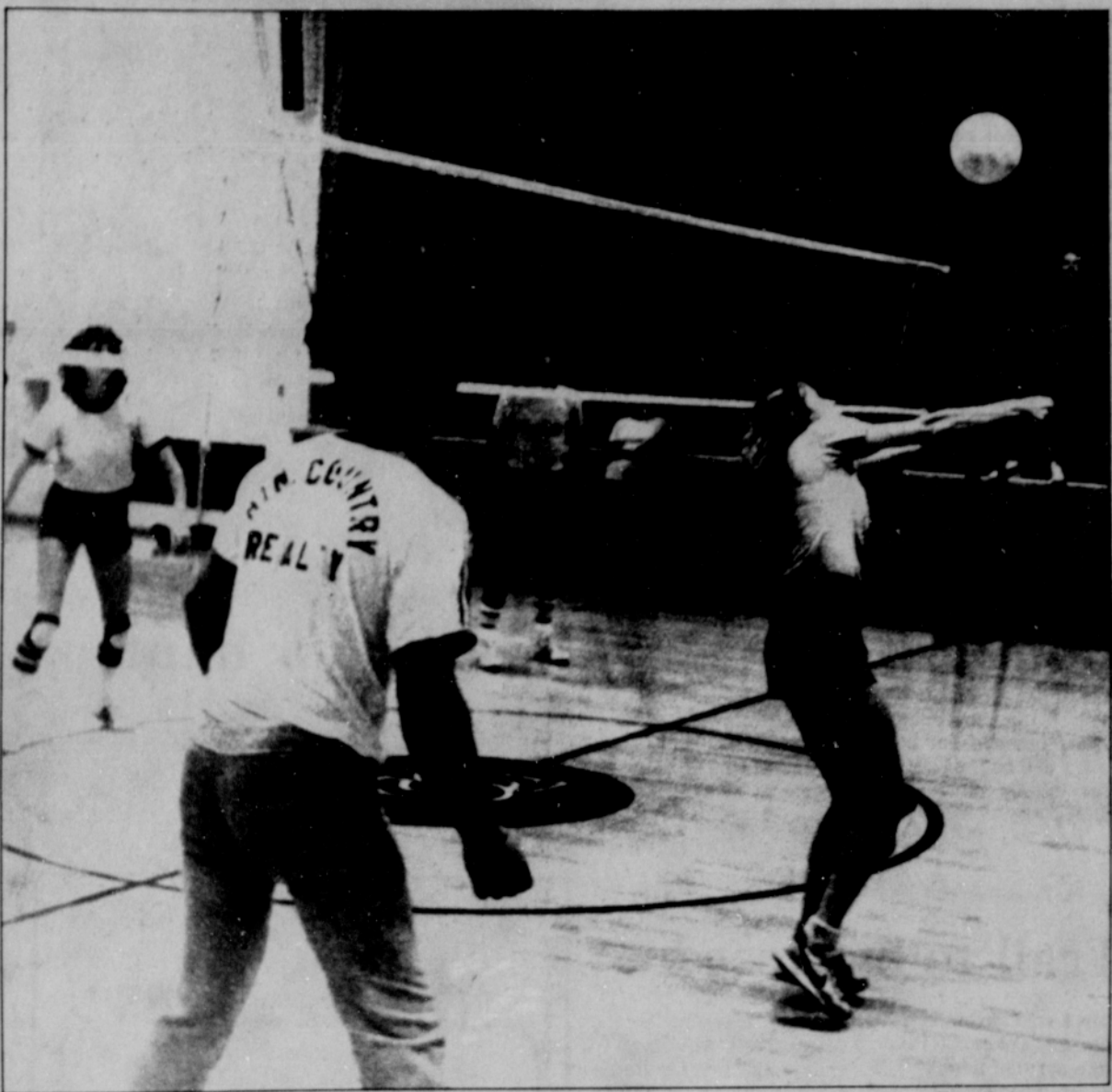
Harris mentioned quarterbacks Gerald Hale and Matt Flisram as two who have contributed so far this

year. Backs Frank Brewster, Paul Dobash, Casey Beaudoin and Bill Christman were also mentioned.

Having coached varsity football, Harris notices some differences.

"With the freshman, you only have them one season and you suffer some withdrawal pains," he said.

He said it is hard to see any progress until the middle of the season and it only really begins to show in the last two or three weeks.

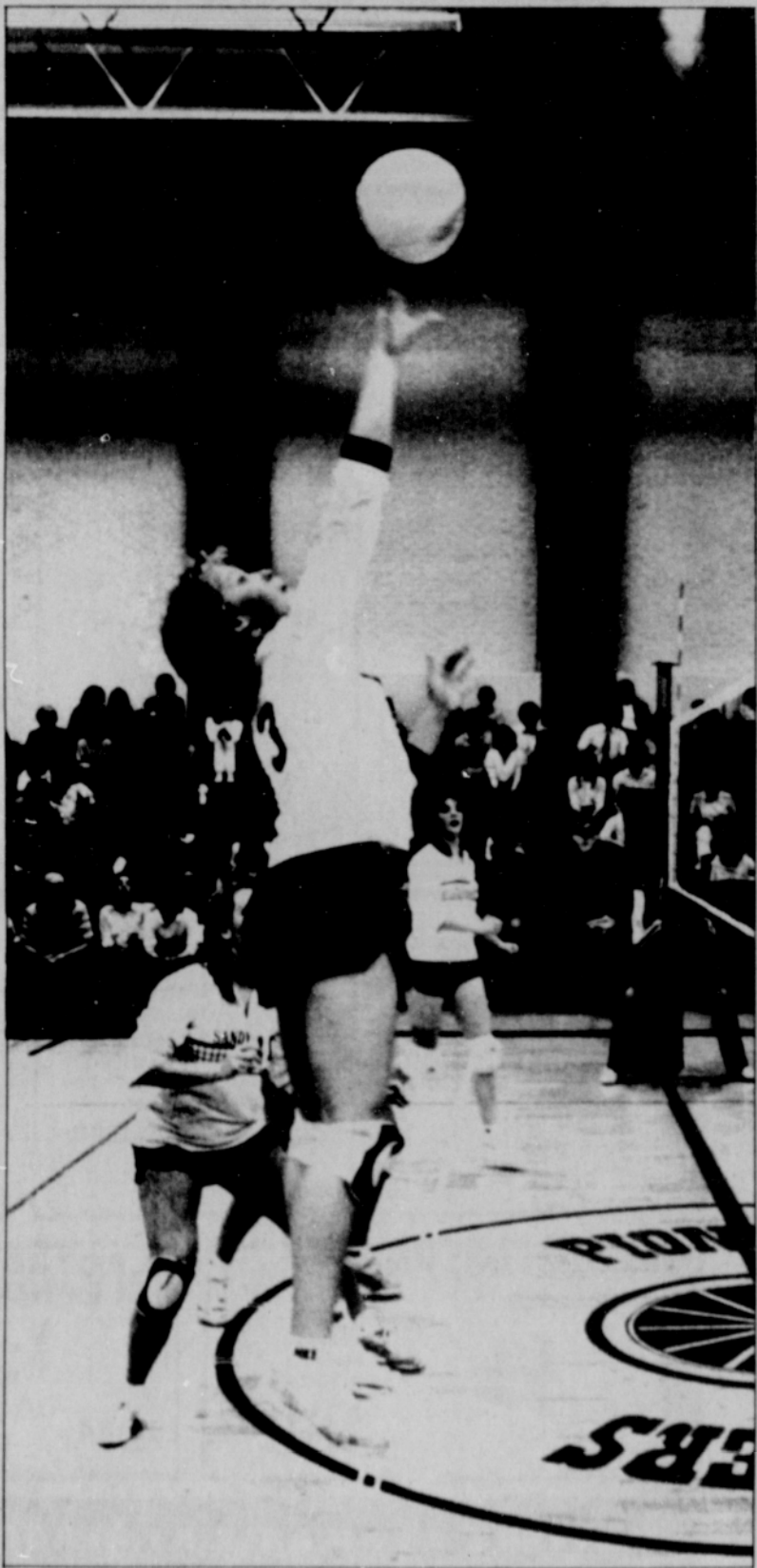

Two wins aid girls

The Pioneer volleyball team appears to be back on the right track with two straight league wins after back-to-back losses to Barlow and David Douglas two weeks ago.

The girls won handily over Parkrose last week, then dismantled Columbia 15-7, 15-5 Tuesday night. Sandy played without Tamee Lindsay, who was injured in the Sany-Barlow Tournament held this weekend. Lindsay is expected to be out for 2-3 weeks.

"We will lose some skills, but one of our strengths is we have skilled people to step in," said coach Ron Grantz.

"We will definitely miss her court sense and leadership, but on the plus side it will give some others a chance

to play," he said.

Sandy failed to advance to the finals in Saturday's tourney, which included eight of the top ten teams in the state. There were sixteen teams playing, eight each at Sandy and Barlow, with the finals at Sandy.

The finish was just as statewide polls show, with one-ranked St. Mary's winning over second-ranked Barlow for the championship. Third-ranked Marshall was also third in the tournament.

Grantz said this was the first one day tournament for 16 teams ever staged in the state.

"It provided us with an opportunity to see what we will be facing if we are at the state tournament," he said.

Indians raid SUHS Homecoming

More yardage still means a loss when you have fewer points on the board and that is the situation the Pioneers found themselves in Friday night.

The Dalles put a damper on Sandy's homecoming festivities with a 17-6 victory in the football game. The Pioneers had outgained the Indians with 165 yards to their 135 but penalties and a failure to capitalize on crucial opportunities cost the game.

It looked like it might be all Sandy as Ryan Coombs took off for a 56 yard TD romp with just two minutes gone in the game. The PAT narrowly missed, putting the Pioneers ahead 6-0.

The first quarter belong to the

Pioneers as they forced The Dalles into turnovers as piled up yardage. Even though Coombs grabbed nearly all of his 116 yards for the game in that quarter, Sandy could not get across the goal line again.

As in the game against Gresham last week, the opponenets capitalized on Pioneer mistakes which gave them the ball within striking distance of the goal.

"When you give them the ball at the 20, it is hard to stop a score," said assistant coach Randy Hutchinson.

"We just turned the ball over to them after a real good start," said head coach Greg O'Meara, "you always think you should win, and this game was no different."

Penalties were of no help to the Pioneers, particularly a questionable pass interference call early in the second half. Dave Lambert had made what appeared to be a clean interception of an Indian pass and ran the ball to the Indian 20. The official ruled another player had tackled the intended receiver. The ensuing drive ended in a field goal for The Dalles.

Penalties and a miscue on a Sandy punt attempt gave the Indians more room to move and the Pioneers failed to mount another serious scoring drive.

Sandy faces Molalla Friday, a non-league match O'Meara says will be against a very tough team.

Reynolds gets win over kickers

Sandy looked to be on the verge of upsetting Reynolds at the half in boys soccer play Thursday, with the game scoreless and an early goal in the second half by the Pioneers to take a 1-0 lead. Reynolds was able to answer with three goals, however, and Sandy went down 3-1.

Tim Pullen scored the goal for Sandy on a penalty kick and the team rallied behind superb goalkeeping by Hank Grenier to hold the Lancers

scoreless at the half.

"Through the real strong play of the keeper, we were able to create some offense and keep the ball away from goal, despite a strong start by Reynolds," said coach Lon Welsh.

The ability of the Lancer offense to execute free kicks prove to be to much for Sandy.

"They kept running the big kids in, especially on the corners, and we had a lot of trouble marking them," said

Welsh.

Two of the Lancer scores came as a result of penalties and Welsh said it could have just as easily been a 1-1 game.

"On the whole it is one of the better games we have played all season," he said.

Sandy must play their final two games of the season without the services of exchangestudent Antii Simola, who broke an arm in the Reynolds game.

Sam Romey took first for the boys, but The Dalles still escaped with a

narrow three point victory.

Romey turned in a personal record time for the season in the 5,000m run at the Clackamas Cavalier Classic this weekend. Romey turned in a time of 16:29 for third place in the tourney.

The boys team was eighth in the meet and beat out both Clackamas

and Milwaukie. The girls finished seventh in their side of the event.

District competition begins Oct. 26 and coach Scott McMullen says Romey is capable of qualifying easily for state. He said Groombridge also has a chance to qualify for a spot in the competition.
