

Service station hit by robbers

A third armed robbery occurred in Sandy Nov. 6 at about 11 p.m. at the Sandy Save Center service station, according to a Sandy police department report.

A brown metallic 1972 Pinto wagon was stolen at the same time as the robbery of the station. Two people in the car at the time were told to get out.

The Pinto hadn't been recovered as of Tuesday. Armed robberies also occurred at service stations in Sandy on Oct. 21 and 26.

On Nov. 2 Kent Storms, 50, of Boring, was cited for shoplifting at Sandy SENTRY.

Also on the 2nd, a 10-speed bicycle valued at \$175 was stolen from a residence in the Sandy Heights area.

On Nov. 7 at 2:15 a.m. a routine traffic stop resulted in the arrest of Frank Bruce Rebarck, 27, who was wanted on an outstanding warrant for fraud from Arkansas.

"We have talented kids over here," he said. "If we can get them out in the community doing creative things, the community will learn that by and large we've got good citizens."

A \$5 charge is made, which includes the cost of the tempera paint, awards for the students and a pizza party.

"We try to come out dead even, without even a nickel left over," Kearney said.

The art department assigns the artists, and all

designs are reviewed by school officials before the day of the painting, which is Dec. 16.

The students get out of school for the morning to do the painting, and then are treated to pizza for lunch.

Students will compete in

two divisions, one for beginners and one for advanced. Originality and theme are among the criteria for judging.

Students have to consider how sign painting is different from doing a painting that will hang on the wall, Kearney said.

"Whether it makes you smile, warms you, or draws a little tear, we want them to make a statement," Kearney said.

Kearney pointed out that sending students out into the community as part of an assignment is not the easiest way to teach a class. "But if we hear good things, we're certainly interested in doing it," he said.

Funeral service for Sandy resident Ollie Wilson was Saturday, Nov. 5 in the chapel of Sandy Funeral Home. Private vault interment was at Mt. View Cemetery in Oregon City.

Mrs. Wilson died in Gresham on Nov. 3 at the age of 96.

She was born Ollie Jane Dugger in Van Zant, Mo., on Sept. 15, 1887. In her early childhood, she moved to Oregon with her family to settle at Grass Valley where she received her education.

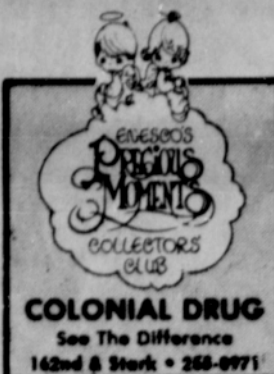
Maupin's vehicle crossed the center line and struck a truck-trailer driven by Wilson Hardee Morrill, 59, of Scappoose, according to the department's report.

Due to the Veteran's Day holiday on Friday, Nov. 11 the U.S. Post Offices in

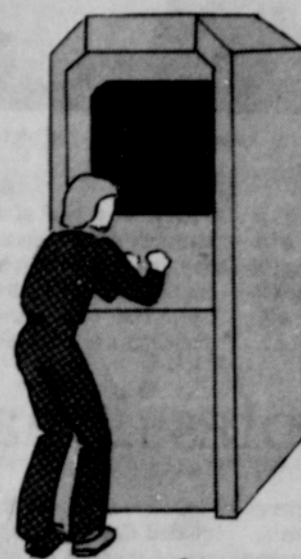
