Pacific Bell to deliver phone books

Delivery of Pacific Northwest Bell's new telephone directory for Government Camp began Nov. 30.

More than 2500 copies of the directory are being mailed to area residences and businesses.

In an open letter to customers at the front of the book, PNB describes itself as a "new kind of telephone company." The letter and Customer Guide section explain what services PNB can and cannot offer when the Bell System is split apart and PNB becomes a separate business on Jan. 1, 1984.

For example, PNB will provide dial tone to access the local and nationwide calling network, but will no longer provide telephone sets. And PNB will provide local and long distance calling within — but not between — two newly established service regions in Oregon.

The postgraduate course was conducted by Dr. John

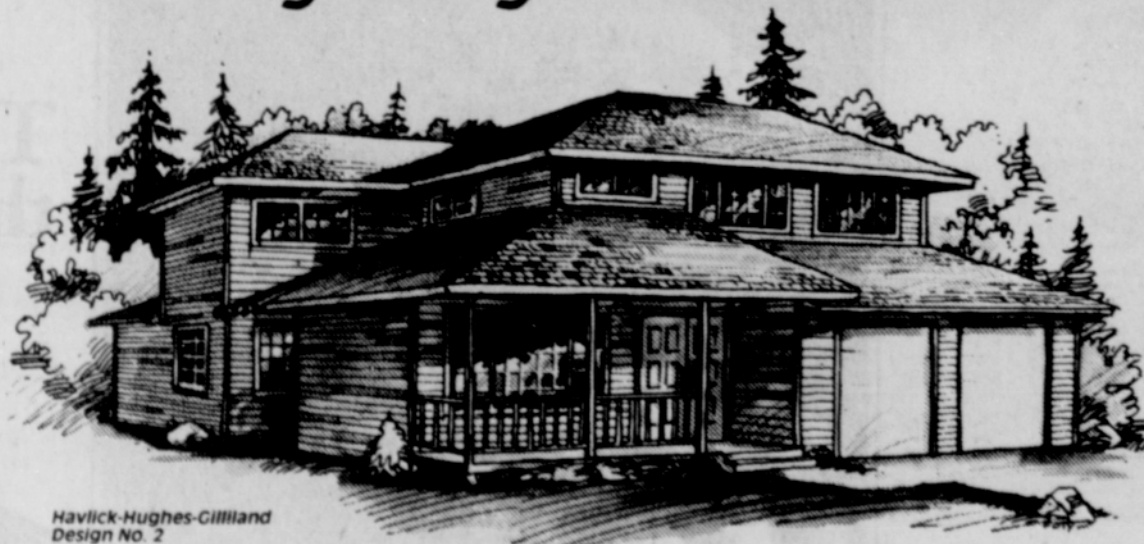
M. Mazion, a chiropractor and board-certified chiropractic orthopaedist from Arizona City, Ariz.

Participants learned to rate possible physical impairments that may have resulted from such things as automobile accidents or on-the-job injuries. Such examinations and ratings are often needed by in-

surance companies and attorneys as a basis for determining disability awards and settlements.

The basis for such ratings is the highly regarded "Guides to the Evaluation of Permanent Impairment," published by the American Medical Association.

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
