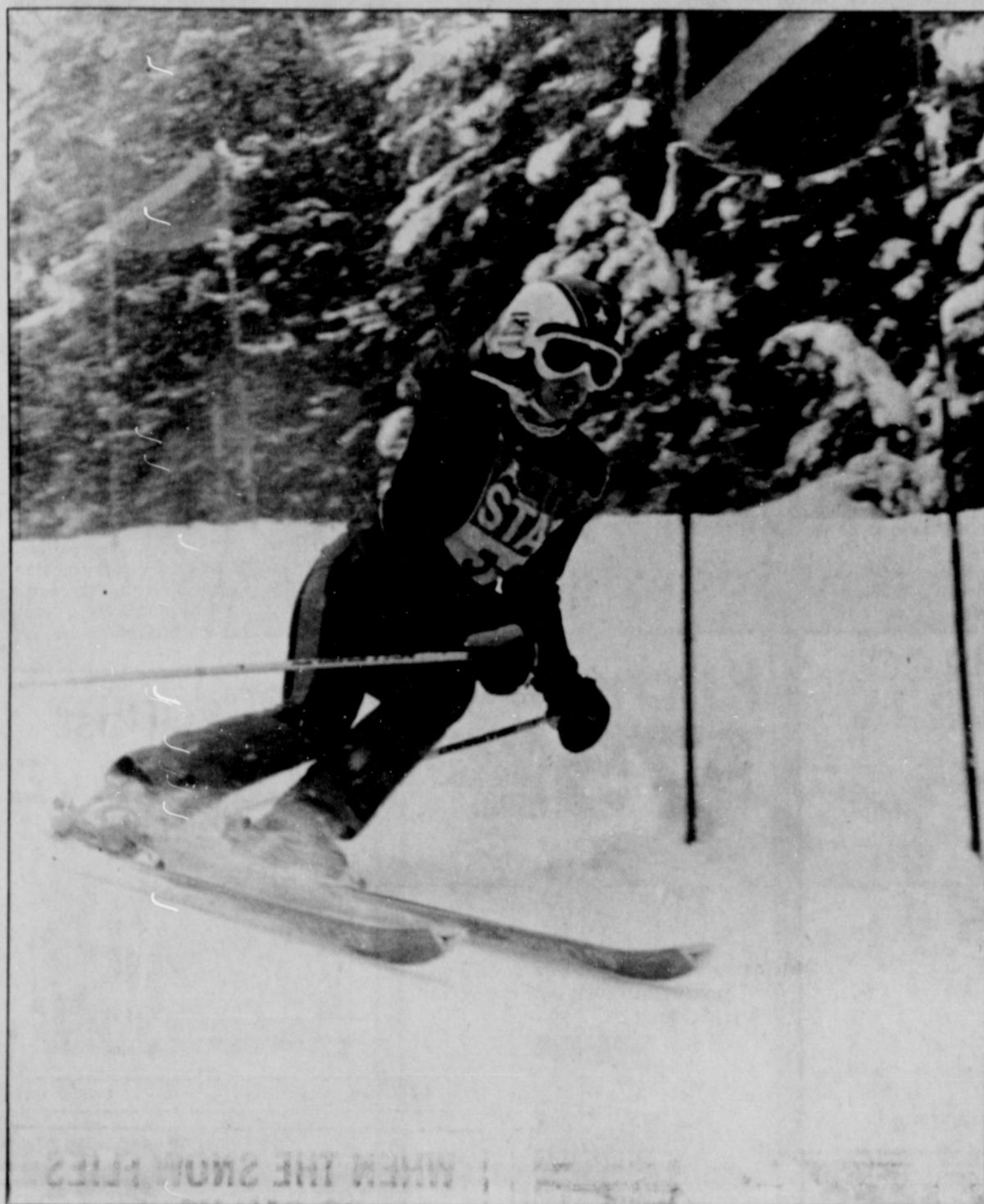


Variety of sports add to 1983 activity

APRIL

The class of 1977 waited through the Sandy Alumni Tourney behind the 27-point scoring of Scott Cravens in the championship game. B division winner was the class of 1982.

Steve Contreras carried a .764 batting average for the SUHS baseball team, but the team struggled to get in the win column, coming from behind to take Barlow 9-6 for a 2-7 record at the end of April.

SUHS graduate Esme Jensen won the NAIA District 2 heptathlon title and another graduate, Gayle Roth, was third.

MAY

The SUHS boys' track team grabbed a victory over Barlow and Parkrose, paced by Scott Skipper, who won three events, discus, javelin, and shot.

Eagle Foundry won the bowling title for the Sandy Early Bird league.

The SUHS baseball team had a four-game win streak snapped by a 1-0 loss to Gresham, just missing a spot in district competition.

Kevin Beaudoin was first in the District Golf Tournament, but faltered at state, with a seven-over 81.

Paige Daugherty set a state record in the shot put early in the month and went on to be the state champion in that event. Scott Skipper threw the discus 211-6 for second at the state championships in Eugene.

Sophomore Wendy Heckard was named to the all-league second team in softball. The girls finished the season at 5-11.

JUNE

Mollie Smith was named Oregon High School Rodeo Association queen. Todd Kasch of Sandy competed in team roping at the State Finals Rodeo in Redmond.

The Sandy One girls' pigtail team topped off a perfect season with a district tournament win. The girls held a season record of 16-0.

The Williams Thriftway Pioneers won the Sunset Valley tournament and owned a 13-1-1 record in June.

JULY

Sandy's first Soap Box Derby was a big success, with 20 racers heading

down the ramp in Industrial Park. Byron Stamm and Greg Martin were the winners who made the trek to Akron, Ohio to compete in nationals.

Almost 150 runners competed in the July Fly in Welches and about seventy competed in the Almost 10-K in Sandy.

Welches won the junior ponytail district title, downing Corbett 2-1.

The Oregon Cultural Exchange wrestling team, with participants Larry Topliff and Coach Ron Calhoun returned from Germany with a 10-1 record over German teams.

Clackamas County Bank won the district title in Senior Ponytail softball competition, winning a tough extra-innings game against another Sandy team, Mac's Devils.

Nine-year-old Trent Waibel scored a first in both the 200 and 400 at regional Junior Olympics in Boise Idaho.

In Senior division baseball, two Sandy teams fought for the district title, with Bruce Cook Insurance beating out Sandy VFW for the number one slot.

The Sandy Midget baseball team won the state title in Canby, using fearless baserunning and timely hitting to take the victory for the 9-10-year-old boys division.

The Dodson's-Ron's No Place rivalry continued in the Sandy Area Softball Association's season. Ron's won the regular season with a 9-0 record and Dodson's won the final tourney.

AUGUST

Monster Lunker fought it out with William's Thriftway to take the city women's softball championship.

"Bus" Morrow of Welches won a 1983 Subaru by garnering a hole-in-one during the Rippling River Celebrity Tournament.

SEPTEMBER

The SUHS volleyball team started out with a ninth ranking in state and continued undefeated through September, moving up to seventh in the rankings.

The Sandy Men's bowling league

began its 25th year.

The SUHS girls' soccer team beat Jefferson 6-0, but faces five of the state's top-ranked teams in the Mt. Hood Conference.

OCTOBER

Gardner Plumbing's Women's soccer team was undefeated through October, finishing the month with a 6-0 record.

SUHS graduates Stephanie Hagstrom, Julie Coleman and Linda Mosbrucker helped pace the MHCC volleyball team to a 20-5 record on top of the Oregon Conference.

Tim Pullen and Joel Dose were given all-league honors for their soccer play in the MHC. On the Girls' team, Crystal Calkins, Krista Searles, and Annika Nilsson were tabbed.

NOVEMBER

The Thoroughbreds of the Sandy Cascade Soccer Club finished the season with a perfect record in the under-10 division.

The injury-plagued SUHS volleyball team closed the season with a first-round loss at district. Tamee Lindsay was named second team all-league. Judi Duff, Jill Ingram, Carrie Byrd and Wendy Coleman were named honorable mention.

Joe Betschart was named first team all-league as a center. Running back Ryan Coombs was voted to the second team and Steve Pettingill, Dave Veddar, Bryan Zimmerman, Rick Searle, Frank McKinnis and Rod Edwards were named honorable mention.

The Gardner Plumbing team won the third division women's title with a 3-0 defeat of a Vancouver team.

DECEMBER

JANUARY

The SUHS swimming team started out the new year in 1983 with a perfect 8-0 record, and it took one of the top teams in the state, David Douglas, to spoil it. Sandy's swimmers finished the month of January with a 10-1 record.

The SUHS wrestling team started out the month ranked second in state, but finished with the number one ranking. The Pioneers won the ranking by beating top-ranked Pendleton at the Oregon City Dual Meet Wrestling Tournament. Sandy also beat reigning state AAA champion Benson 54-15.

Meanwhile the SUHS boys' ski team was taking over sole possession of first in the Mt Hood Conference race and the girls' team was headed for their third consecutive state title. Both Cedar Ridge basketball

teams did well, finishing the season with an eighth-grade 10-4 record and seventh-grade 13-1 record.

FEBRUARY

SUHS wrestlers made Parkrose sorry they even showed, trouncing Parkrose 65-0, enroute to a second-place finish at district later in the month. Ten wrestlers advanced to state competition and Larry Topliff and Chuck Kearney left as champions. Kearney with a 34-0 record for the season. Scott Skipper took fourth, and the Sandy team placed second in the AAA meet.

Five swimmers, Shawn Burns, Richard Rolph, Jamie Tuttle and Matt Roth competed at the state swimming championships, with sophomore Roth taking a fifth in the 100 butterfly.

Jensen were named as honorable mention members of the MHC all-league girls' basketball team.

The Sandy women's soccer team, sponsored by Gardner Plumbing won the NUWS Indoor tournament at Clackamas Community College.

Both boys and girls won for the combined Mt. Hood Ski Championship at Multitorpor Ski Bowl.

MARCH

Swartz Moving captured the championship of the B division in Sandy recreational league basketball.

The SUHS girls' ski team lived up to expectations and swept their third state championship at Mt. Bachelor, with Anne Sarich, Sue Sarich, Ulla Pearson and Char Bridge leading the way for the girls.

Coach Ron Calhoun was named coach of the year and Chuck Kearney was named wrestler of the year at the Oregon Wrestling Hall of Fame banquet.

Bicyclist Mike Sheppard was selected to spend three weeks at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs.

The Boring Birds capped their first season in the Sandy volleyball league by taking first-place honors, beating 7-1 Mt. Hood Cleaners 15-5 and 15-1.
