3 businesses keep baker cooking

There is no business in Sandy called "Prime Time Donut Kingdom."

However, Dave Cary can be excused for inadvertently answering the phone at times with phrases that sound like such an establishment exists. Dave and his wife, Kris, own Prime Time Video, Country Donut House, and the Kids Kingdom clothing store, all in Sandy. Prime Time has been open for three years, Kids Kingdom has been open for three months, and The Country

Donut House has been open just three weeks. Dave has a simple explanation for his involvement in so many businesses.

"My objective is to bring my checkbook balance up to zero," he said.

Country Donut House is the third restaurant in which Cary has been involved.

"I really wanted a doughnut house and not a restaurant, but here I am doing lunches again," said Cary.

His new restaurant features soups, salads and

sandwiches in addition to doughnuts.

Cary said the location of this restaurant is the best of the three he has operated and he is encouraged by early customer response. Cary enjoys talking with people, so there is another reason for his enthusiasm about the shop.

"I think I will like this because I get to spend more time out front," he said.

Keeping the three businesses separate is not as hard as it might seem, according to Cary.

"I usually stop by the

video store on the way home, but I don't do much else there.

"Having good people there makes it a whole lot easier," he said.

Kids Kingdom is primarily run by his wife, Kris.

"I feel very good about the way my wife has put that together," said Cary.

Cary has operated many businesses over the years, and one of his employees said he "only keeps them three years."

"I tend to get bored," said Cary, "it used to bother me, but now I am beginning to accept that."

The Country Donut House may be different, however. Cary said he decided to open it eight years ago, so if he stays interested that long, running the business will probably keep his interest also.

Cary said he spends 14 hours a day at the restaurant, doing everything from serving coffee to baking the bread. While he anticipates changes at the restaurant, there is one goal he puts foremost.

"I want to cut down to about 12 hours," he said.

Queen's Ball is added to Festival

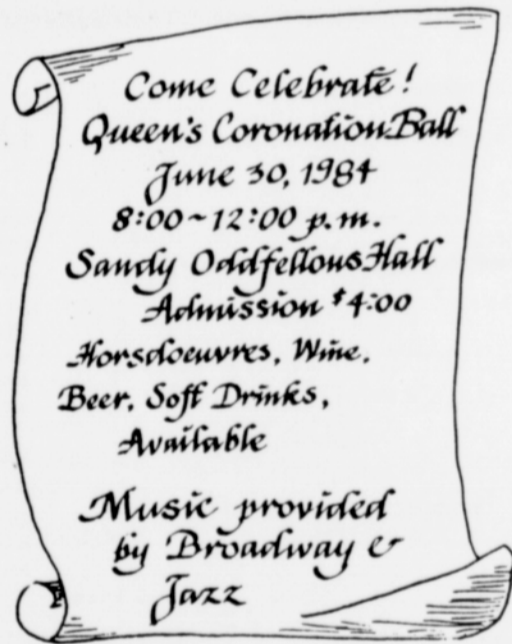

To low-income people

Cheese to be given out

Procedures for distributing cheese and other commodities to low income people have changed, according to Maggie Spannaus, a board member of the Sandy Community Action Center.

Two pieces of identification will be needed. That identification may include a current utility bill, such as one from the electric company, a telephone bill or gas bill. If one's utilities are paid by the landlord, Spannaus suggests a note from the landlord.

A driver's license, cur-

rent personal letter or voter registration may also be used, Spannaus said.

Migrant farm workers may get a note from their foreman or owner and that will be sufficient identification, she said.

The next commodities distribution will be June 30. The forms filled out for this distribution will qualify families for distributions on Sept. 15, Dec. 15, March 16 (1985) and June 15 (also 1985).

Spannaus said the procedure will take longer than before, so eligible people should be prepared to wait in line.

The distribution in Sandy will be held from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., depending on how long the commodities hold out.

Spannaus said people should take their own containers. Commodities to be

given out will be five pounds of cheese, three pounds of honey and three pounds of butter.

Shut-ins who are eligible may contact Pat at the Sandy Community-Senior Center, and the commodities will be delivered.

Spannaus estimates there are large numbers of shut-ins who have not been participating in the program.

Gross income requirements are set by the state of Oregon. If the monthly income for a one-person household is \$540 or less, that person is eligible. The figure is \$916 for a three-person household, or \$1,294 for a five-person household.

Another cheese distribution center locally is the Women's Club building on Salmon River Road in Wemme.

For the matinee, tickets are \$5 for adults, and \$3.50 for senior citizens and children.
