### PUBLIC NOTICE OF FILING APPLICATION FOR ELECTRIC RATE DECREASE

On June 8, 1984 Portland General Electric Company (PGE) filed revised rate schedules with the Public Utility Commissioner of Oregon (PUC) to decrease electric service rates for residential and farm customers.

If the application is approved, residential and farm rates will decrease an average of 3.9 percent. Rates for commercial and industrial customers will not change. With Commissioner approval of this application the Company revenue received from these customers will decrease \$11.1 million effective for meter readings on and after July 31, 1984. For residential customers using 1,000 kWh/month their bill would decrease \$1.82.

This decrease comes as a result of implementing another phase of the Pacific Northwest Power Planning and Conservation Act (Regional Power Act). This Act, which became law on December 5, 1980, gives residential and farm customers access to power from the Bonneville Power Administration (BPA). The Act provides that in July 1984 the fraction of the residential and farm load that the Company is allowed to exchange with BPA will increase from 80 to 90 percent. This filing passes on these additional savings to our residential and farm customers.

The BPA has proposed to change the "Average System Cost" methodology under which these savings are calculated. If the proposal is adopted by the Federal Energy Regulatory Agency, it will be necessary to increase rather than decrease rates to residential and farm customers. PGE is continuing to oppose vigorously this increase proposal.

The purpose of this notice is to provide PGE customers with general information as to proposals made by the Company and their effect on customers. The calculations and statements contained in this notice will not be binding on the Public Utility Commissioner of Oregon.

Copies of the Company's proposed rates and exhibits are available for inspection at PGE's business offices listed below. Company personnel will be available to answer questions or assist in locating particular information. If you wish to receive other information or notice of time of any additional public hearings, if scheduled, a special toll-free number 1-800-522-2404 has been established by the PUC.
